Hi everyone:

First of all, I want to thank everyone who responded to my inquiry on Genealogy Lock Ins. I am still working out the details of how I am going to handle this and when but for those interested in the replies that I received, I will post a short version of what I received.

Some libraries held a regular program along with the lock in and had scheduled workshops on beginning genealogy etc. but most just held a basic research night whereby everyone was able to do research at their own pace.

Most libraries held theirs from around 6 pm to around 11:00 pm or midnight. A few went all night from 6 pm to 6 am.

Most had pre registration but decided ahead of time just how many they could accomodate. It was suggested to have 1 person per every 2 chairs at a table since genealogists like to spread out!

Need 2-3 or more staffers or volunteers to help with reshelving books and helping the researchers.

Consider food. Most ordered pizza midway through the event and just collected money for that. Some charged a flat fee of \$5 to \$14. The \$5 fee was to cover pop and pizza but it did not cover so probably should charge more. The one library that charged \$14 said that this included \$10 to be donated to the Friends of the Library to buy more gen. books and the \$4 was for pizza. Also need to consider here where they will eat. If the staff lunchroom is close by the gen. dept. you could have them eat there. You really don't want them running all over the library.

You may want to have a security guard or staff member to operate the door as people leave at different times. You may have to establish a certain time for people to come in so that you don't have a revolving door situation. One librarian overbooked the number of reg. as she knew from experience that some would cancel at the last minute while others would sign up at the last minute.

All agreed that it was very successful for their library and some even stated that they do this on a regular basis, even as often every 3 months, some every 6 months. Most did them annually.

The big issue in my mind is where to have the food and how much to charge. Our staff lunchroom is small and they would have to eat in shifts but we could work that out. One librarian mentioned that they had high caffiene drinks to keep everyone awake! The majority seemed to have theirs run for about 5-6 hrs and end at midnight. That is what I am planning on. It was mentioned that you may want to plan way ahead and get as much publicity as you can since people from out of town will want to attend.



If anyone has any other questions in regard to the replies I received on this, you can email me and I will be happy to reply.  
I have decided to have this event but just not sure when or what the details are yet.

On 28 Aug, Michael Mulholland <mmulholl@ahml.lib.il.us> inquired about the meaning of a CR card in the Soundex index to passenger lists.

Marian L. Smith, Historian at the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), has provided the following answer:

The reference on an INS soundex (or other index) card to "CR" is a reference to a Certificate of Registry. Such certificates were only issued IN and AFTER 1929 to immigrants who qualified under the Registry Act of 1929. Those qualifications were:

1. Immigrants who arrived AFTER June 29, 1906, and BEFORE July 1921. Later, the dates were adjusted to include those who arrived BEFORE July 1924. There are occasional, rare cases where CR's were issued to people who arrived before 1906.
2. Immigrants for whom NO ARRIVAL RECORD COULD BE FOUND. That is, after extensive searching of all immigration records, no records could be found relating to the immigrant. Thus any "CR" reference should indicate to a researcher they can stop looking for a passenger list. The index card may say the immigrant arrived in 1910, but that index card was made in or after 1929 and asserts a claim not based on any passenger list.

People who arrived after 1906 had to have an immigration record if they wanted to naturalize. Lots of people had no record, or had no way of knowing the information needed to locate the record (name, port, date) and so no record could be found. They were stuck and unable to naturalize until 1929 when the new law allowed them to apply for Registry, which means they applied to have an immigration record created. They had to do a lot of paperwork and submit a lot of

evidence with their application.

When approved, a Record of Registry was created as their immigration record, showing the earlier date of arrival. The immigrant was also issued a Certificate of Registry. All the paperwork was put in a Registry File. All the files were indexed at the INS Washington, DC, and some were indexed in the border records (north and south), and I've seen the cards come from the NY and Boston pass list soundexes.

Researchers may encounter the following types of numbers (SAMPLES below):

CR 165041

R-12345 (more often found in the border records).

If a researcher has the second number, R-#####, they can request that file under INS FOIA/PA. They should make clear they seek the Registry File Number R-#####.

If a researcher has the first number, CR-#####, they can request that INS FOIA/PA search for the registry file. They must provide the name, dob, and pob of the immigrant, and make CLEAR they want the index to be searched for a Registry File number, and then want a copy of that file.

Some researchers never seem to grasp the fact that Registry records mean there never was any passenger list record, or that record is listed under a completely unknown name, and so they should give up looking for him/her in the NARA microfilm.

I guess I was the first one here to report on the new pricing from Gale. Our library made the decision to purchase it despite the \$1400 price. Then, to our delight, the AccessMichigan project purchased the database and is making it available free of charge to all public libraries throughout the state of Michigan. This is just one of many products we enjoy through them. Naturally, we have voided our own contract with Gale for Ancestry Plus. It would be wonderful if more statewide organizations could make this resource possible in other locations throughout the country so the small, underfunded libraries can have access to the wealth of information normally only possible for the large libraries.

Recently, we were told by Ancestry that we needed to start paying. We were told the amount of the renewal and felt we couldn't afford it. Then, somehow we did renew for less than previously quoted. We paid \$399.95 to MyFamily.com for a subscription with one user. We needed more than one user and ended up paying an additional \$359.70 to have 6 additional concurrent users. This subscription does not give us access to the digitized census records. We are now considering the ProQuest/Heritage Quest service because we need access to their good census records. I don't know yet how we are going to do all of this because it take away from our book budget which wasn't that big to start with.

Our mid-sized public library subscribed to Ancestry.com for a single-user subscription in early 2000 and for 2001 added a second computer as well as access to the digitized census records, for considerably less than \$1000. There was a flurry of use in the beginning, which has tapered off considerably as more patrons invested in home access. We haven't seen many census records available yet, so I'm also wondering what we've been paying for! My 2002 budget was already set and approved before the recent changes in HQ/Ancestry.com ownership, and now we are facing the situation of both ProQuest and Gale Group offering their 'enhanced' products for \$1200 (a library consortium price for the ProQuest products) and up. Frankly, given the small amount of time our patrons use the service (despite marketing), I've serious doubts about whether this is a good way in which to spend our limited funds. We're also only 90 miles away from Ft. Wayne and have a FHL in town, so our patrons do have access to much of what is offered online. Is such a large investment for 'immediate' access really worth it?? I'd like to hear from others in my situation, particularly since I have to make a decision about the ProQuest investment by next Friday!

Our library had been loath to pay for online access to genealogical databases at the pre-takeover price points, and are completely loath to do so now.

I think there's something to what you've suggested, that for this specialized a subject area, the patrons who would be interested enough to use this data regularly are procuring access personally and not bothering with a library. That's one of the reasons we haven't gotten deep into genealogical CD-ROMs either. At the post-takeover price points, it only seems to make sense to procure database access on a system/consortium/statewide base, unless you are an institution of national genealogical repute, like Allen County or Wisconsin Historical Society.

Even if you're a larger institutional animal or collection of animals, choices have to be made on the use of scarce resources. Our consortium recently sent a questionnaire asking us to prioritize from a couple of dozen subject areas about which online subscriptions have been produced. Our staff ranked genealogy came in fourth on the priority list, after automobile repair, health, and reader's advisory databases. By the time you get to #4, is there money left? Depends.

It's unfortunate that the free market has made these choices that much more difficult--only time will tell whether these databases will continue to develop and prosper at these price points (or higher or lower).

Our only hope is what, for lack of a better term on a Monday morning, I'd call the "weed propagation" tendency in the capitalist economy. The databases controlled by the post-consolidation firms were often collected together for less capitalistic and more altruistic ends. The power of the firms now controlling them, however, is not absolute.

I will give you a small example now occurring in our local area. In the late 1970s and early 1980s, the local genealogical society compiled inscriptions of the county's cemeteries. This database is available in print, but institutional inertia on the society's part (unwillingness to put on the Internet, sentiment about creating info and letting go for free, etc.) will likely preclude the automation, much less the digital publishing of that database on the Internet, for a number of years.

However, individual researchers, unencumbered by the institutional inertia of the group, realizing that there's no intellectual monopoly on collecting cemetery data, have gone ahead and re-read those cemeteries themselves, compiled that information in electronic format, and is making the information available to GenWeb sites and our library for online publication. Some of the data accessible through our library's website at [http://www.scls.lib.wi.us/mcm/local/local\\_history.html](http://www.scls.lib.wi.us/mcm/local/local_history.html) are examples of such "guerrilla tactics."

We as librarians may not have much market power against a Gale or a Bell & Howell, but we can play a constructive role in guerrilla actions such as the one I've described above. By considering making our own bandwidth available for local initiatives, or by providing at least a coordinating role for those trying to independently get their data online, we can collectively provide an alternative to the post-consolidation megabases.

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SAR PATRIOT INDEX TO INCLUDE PICTURES OF GRAVESTONES

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The SAR Patriot Index Committee has announced that work has started on the Third Edition of the SAR Patriot Index CD. This Edition will again break new ground in genealogy database concepts by including pictures of tombstones of Patriot Ancestors and their spouses. In addition, the Third Edition will include data from as many recent Applications and Supplemental Applications as can be processed by the publication date.

The SAR Patriot Index CD contains information about many thousands of the Patriots who served heroically during the Revolutionary War to establish our Country. The CD contains the Patriot's name, the service they performed in liberating our Country as well as, in many cases, their entire lineage down to present day members of the Sons of the American Revolution.

By way of review, work started on establishing a database of SAR Patriot Ancestors almost a decade ago with keying the names of SAR Patriot Ancestors into a lineage linked database together with their spouses and, in most

cases, the first generation of their descent. The database was soon expanded to include the complete lineages of SAR Members, and State Societies were invited to submit the complete lineage of their own members. A number of State Societies participated by submitting the lineages in their archives, including Florida, California, Missouri, Maryland and Alabama. In addition, the Georgia and Pennsylvania Societies keyed a portion of their archive records into the database.

With the publication of the First Edition of the SAR Patriot Index CD in 1998, a National policy was established to include all Applications and Supplemental Applications in future SAR Patriot Index CDs.

The SAR Patriot Index Committee worked closely with Progeny Publishing to develop the specifications for the original search and retrieval software for the Patriot Index database. This software, called the Progeny Family Explorer, forms the interface to the Patriot Index records and allows users to view and print standard genealogy charts and reports. Since 1998 there have been several upgrades to this software, with the latest being the ability to include pictures of tombstones on the upcoming release of the third edition of the SAR Patriot Index CD in 2002.

The main source for the pictures to be included on the new Patriot Index CD is going to be those SAR members who have taken a picture of their Patriot Ancestor's tombstone as part of the documentation process for their own application or as general documentation for their personal genealogy. In addition, local SAR Chapters are encouraged to locate and photograph the tombstones of Revolutionary War Patriots located in their general area for use in the SAR Patriot Index CD as well to provide permanent documentation of aging tombstones.

Any member of SAR (or DAR for that matter) can simply send a picture of a Patriot Ancestor's tombstone to:

The picture will be scanned and, if requested, returned to the member sending it in.

Please include the following information with each picture so that it may be properly identified with the appropriate Patriot Ancestor in the SAR Patriot Index database.

Name and address of member or submitter e-mail address (if available), SAR/DAR National Number (if appropriate), Name of Patriot Ancestor Name and location of cemetery

The only restrictions are that the picture be suitable for publishing, which means that you own the picture, and that the inscription on the tombstone can be read (or at least partially deciphered).

I haven't seen any responses to Don Litzer's post, so I'll chime in to support his idea. While most libraries are not affiliated with the online history and genealogy projects, we can certainly take advantage of their help in getting material online. You may find the coordinator of your local county by checking the national sites - <<http://www.usgenweb.org>> or <<http://www.alhn.org>>, for example. The webmasters may not be local - some of the other New York USGenWeb coordinators are in other states or countries - but they frequently have volunteers in your area. You might also reach out to local genealogy groups.

If you have the facilities, you could have volunteers come in and scan or type in information from census microfilm or books. You might also have remote volunteers who will work from photocopies... I have a lot of books which don't scan well unless you copy them anyway. Lists of location- and family-specific mailing lists may be found at <[http://www.rootsweb.com/~jfuller/gen\\_mail.html](http://www.rootsweb.com/~jfuller/gen_mail.html)>; sign on and I bet you'll find someone who will work for you either because they think your project is really cool, or out of self-interest because they want to find information for their own research.

Finally, don't overlook local government offices. You may be lucky enough, as we are, to have a county clerk who is enthusiastic about getting old records online. Even if they can't provide you with help, sometimes just allowing easy access to original records is enough.

An exciting new project is the development of plans for a genealogical reference help-desk. This help-desk will give members access to reference and referral services to help them find and interpret historical and genealogical information. Tailored to the individual needs of each researcher, this will be a tremendous benefit to NGS members.

NGS will continue to accept donations for the circulating collection, and with its partner, make these additional materials available to the entire genealogical community. While the St. Louis County Library will maintain its core genealogy collection as a non-circulating reference collection, the NGS circulating collection will provide the whole genealogical community with access to a significant and growing circulating collection of genealogical reference materials.
