The New Orleans Public Library has the microfilmed records of 51 out of 64 parishes (counties) in Louisiana. We had to get letters of permission from the Clerks of Court to purchase these films from the Family History Center over the past 35 years and had to agree to the restriction of not allowing in-house photocopies and referring the patron back to the court house for the copies. Last year we had a situation where documents from a probate case were missing at the court house but were available on the Mormon microfilms. We requested and received an official letter of permission from the Clerk of Court before copying the documents. Two years ago we received similar permission from the Clerk of Court of a different parish to copy and certify copies of early nineteenth century documents from Mormon microfilms. In each case we felt that we had to go through this process because we would have otherwise been violating the terms of our agreements.

That's very interesting to know. The Kansas State Historical Society works with the LDS church to get permission from the various courts, etc. for them to microfilm the records. For our help, we get a copy of every reel microfilmed.

According to our Local Government Archivist - "LDS/GSU signs an agreement through KSHS/record custodian regarding access/copying. LDS/GSU usually in Kansas never has a custodian that restricts heavily, so in almost all cases unless we know otherwise we are free to copy/use any GSU film we receive."

I don't know if it would be different for microfilm at a public library.

Books, which cannot be checked out from our department, are another story.

You didn't say whether you require your patron to write down the number and name of the fiche they are using in the booking sheet. I think this would prevent the bulk of the theft, as the returned fiche would have to match. Good luck.

Chad Leinaweaver is right on target. It is absolutely imperative that those of you in New Jersey must act and act now! Telephone calls cannot be ignored in the same way as can letters and E-mail. Please don't rely on others to take action. Every telephone call counts. Mobilize your own library personnel and contact your local genealogical and historical societies to have their members make calls. A telephone call will cost less than a postage stamp.

Those of you in other states, be sure to investigate what your own state government

is considering. Speaking from our recent experience here in Florida, I can tell you that our state governor and our legislators had their budget chainsaws sharpened and well-oiled. There were budget cuts directly affecting all public and academic libraries, as well as the movement of \$11,150,000 in recurring funds to non-recurring for the next year. This is terrible news because it means that those monies will not have to be applied for by the libraries! More important, though, is the fear that Governor Jeb Bush will slash that money altogether in order to balance his budget. (The movement of recurring funds in other categories to non-recurring funds last year became his target for slashing dollars to balance his budget this year.) Unfortunately, too few librarians made their concerns known to the governor's office and to their legislators. As a result, we certainly will see shorter hours, personnel attrition, curtailment of collection development and special programs, and a variety of other painful losses.

State governments across the nation are poised to consider other legislative actions to slash budgets. Once they see successes in Florida, New Jersey and elsewhere, other states will follow suit.

I apologize if it appears that I am on a soapbox. However, as the owner of a company focusing on continuing education for libraries and librarians, and as a genealogist, I am a fervent believer in the vital importance of libraries to communities. Many of our elected officials have no clue about what libraries do and how important they are. It is your and my responsibility to educate them too.

federal publications distributed by GPO through the program. The
requirements for the program are

in Section 19 of Title 44 of the U.S. Code. The formats distributed
through the program include printed reports, microfiche, CD-ROMs, DVDs,
and maps. The program also provides access to online publications and

services via the Internet."

In the past, it was the database that anyone -- Church members or non-members alike -- could use to deposit a copy of their personal genealogy database via GEDCOM. It is my understanding that when the church launched the FamilySearch web site, the Ancestral File database wasn't easily converted to the new format and that there would be limitations. So, they launched the Pedigree Resource File services instead. Users of the FamilySearch site (members or non-members) can send their GEDCOM to be included in the PRF. Their data will appear in the database search on the site and will also be published on of the many, inexpensive CD-ROM sets available from the church.

Basically, AF and PRF serve the same purpose -- a lineage linked database for user contribution. One is just BI and the other AI (Before Internet and After Internet) <g>.

We bought several Minolta MicroSP 2000 microfilm reader-printers about three years ago after evaluating a Canon and this Minolta. The Minolta and Canon made excellent copies. After that there was no comparison. The Minolta was much more user friendly. A mix of Type 1 and Type 2 lens were bought to give us flexibility when enlarging. The more powerful Type 2 lens is somewhat more popular with users. We anticipated considerably less instruction time with the public for the Minolta and that has been correct. Staff and the public have enjoyed the Minolta machines very much. Most of the repairs have been to the advance-rewind knob. It wears out. There have been very few other repairs. I have not seen the current Canon or Minolta machines.

Ancestral File and Pedigree Resource File are both still active. One can submit to either. Ancestral File accepts disks through postal mail, while Pedigree Resource File allows online submissions. Both ask for submissions to be in GEDCOM format. AF includes data submitted since 1980 (mostly on paper originally), while PRF began accepting submission in May 1999.

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Ancestral File (AF) still accepts submissions. In the past, data has been merged. That is, when two or more people submit the same name, AF attempts to combine them into a single entry. Some of the problems people complain about are:

- 1) When some information on the two submissions is different, the correct information may be lost in favor of incorrect information since AF doesn't know which is right. AF's policy (in the interest of simplicity) is to keep whichever was submitted first. People wanting to change something already in Ancestral File need to use the correction process rather than resubmitting.
- 2) Sometimes the system mistakenly merges two people when in fact they are not the same person, thus confusing two separate families or generations into one.
- 3) No sources are preserved in the public version of AF except the name(s) of the submitters.

Greetings from Toronto!

As a licensed Lay Officiant at St. James' (Anglican) Cathedral here in Toronto and as a genealogical motivational speaker, I have been using the Monk story for years, and there are so many ways to embellish it!

Originally I saw the item about 1975 in a religious magazine from England or Rome and it was then used strictly in the sense of a joke concept about the use of the words "celebrate" versus "celibate".

I developed it into a genealogical scenario, and first used it in lectures at The Ontario Genealogical Society Conferences before 1980. However I also heard it from some one else at the same time, who had done the same thing. So indeed as much I would love to claim the concept, I can only admit to having used it for about 25 years. Indeed, it could be part of an "urban legend" origin.

Never will I forget the look on Milton Rubincam's face when I told him the story about the Monks. He was a dinner guest in my home while here in Toronto for a conference. After dinner he was enjoying dessert [one of his favorites was my mother's Dutch apple pie recipe]. He laughed so hard he almost choked. Another one of our dinner companions that same evening was the late Donna Hotaling, former Secretary to The BCG, and she being a practicing Roman Catholic laughed until she cried.

The late Milton Rubincam, in case you do not know, was one of the "founders" of the American genealogical movement about 60 years ago. I had the pleasure of his friendship for many years, as well as Donna's - and they are both missed very much.

Should you find anything more about the author of the original story I would like to be kept informed so that I too can give credit where it is due.

However, I will take credit for another genealogy story - and if you want I will post the complete details of this very innocent, but hysterically funny occurrence, in a subsequent e-mail to the list. The following is a summation:

Many years ago, I was lecturing to The Whitby - Oshawa Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society, when I coined the exclamatory phrase :

" Wow, what a G.O.! "

[G. O. = genealogical orgasim]

To this day I still hear people saying "Wow, what a G.O. I had at The Archives the other night".

I have a patron who has been working on abstracting will books from a nearby county. Will Book A covers the period 1875-1930 and Will Book B the period 1930-1966. He has been told that it is a no-no to split books. If he publishes only Will Book A it will be very small and hardly worth publishing. Will book B comes too far in the 20th century to make him comfortable about invading privacy. He is thinking about only publishing through 1950 to protect many legatees. Although they are public records, he does not want to offend anyone.

He is looking for recommendations. Georgia did not mandate death records until 1919 and the state did 90% compliance was not obtained until 1928, so these are very helpful records even though recent by most standards.

Hello everyone,

The 1930 census catalog is at the printers and has been there a couple weeks at least. So, it should be out soon, although don't ask me when....

I can say categorically that the 1930 census has not been shipped in advance to LDS or anybody else. Pre-orders will not be shipped until April 1. We take the 72 year rule seriously.

When the 1920 census was released, the 1920 census microfilm catalog had been publicly available for about a year ahead, so anybody who needed to do their cataloging in advance, LDS included, would have had no difficulty in doing that "in advance." I wasn't on staff when 1920 was released so I am not in a position to comment on what may or may not have happened in 1992. However, I'm sure our agency took the 72 year rule just as seriously then.

I would appreciate hearing all of the replies to Deb's query regarding issues that might arise in creating a stand-alone department. Hopefully, there are a number of other libraries who have prospered like the Wayne County Public Library has.

Here are several questions I would like to see answered or discussed in detail before I made a move such as the one contemplated in Wayne County. There surely are many more.

Who will have building supervision at the new location? Who will see that security is regularly provided and performed? Who will determine when the hours of operation change, e.g., because of storms? Who will determine when changes such as adding additional electrical/data wiring needs to be made?

Have you compared your electrical/data demands with that of the other department's demand in light of what the building capabilities are? (You may not be able locate your equipment where you want to.) Have you thought about your need for light being different from that demanded by the other department? (Filtered vs. unfiltered?)

Would there be any changing in funding for the newly located department? Will your business office now have separate accounts for the new department's expenses that hitherto have been included in another account? Expenses like those for postage or light bulbs or toilet paper might be overlooked yet necessary in this process of establishing a department at a new location.

Have you laid out a tentative work schedule to see that your area will be adequately staffed? Have you compared that with the other department's tentative work schedule to insure that there are no hidden gaps in service?

Well!! I see from my brief moments of writing this message that Deb has her hands full. I hope others will put in their two cents to assist her.

Specifically, housing the Genealogy and Local History Department with an Archives Center and possible county offices. I want to thank everyone for their input. A lot of good information was received. To summarize, some of the main concerns facing such a decision center around funding, staffing, hours of operation, duplication of reference material, and ownership of the building and materials. Several other issues came up but these were the concerns most often expressed. A few others responded that they could not wait until Genealogy and Main collection would be together again.
