Larry and the group-

The Alexandria Library, Special Collections does charge for responding to distant researchers. In our contact with them we articulate that we allow one hour of research time on specific questions. For example, we will not research and draw up the family tree; we will refer the distant researcher to a stable of local pros who charge by the hour.

The type of questions we will respond to are the type to find specific information, i.e., obits, burial locations, birth data, marriage data, residence, census, etc. There's not much you can do in an hour.

We do not charge a research fee, our fee is a photocopy/postage fee. Due to the local VA/DC/MD library consortium, we charge \$5 for mailing addresses in these jurisdictions, all others are \$10. That buys a lot of copies and we will bump it upwards if the copy job gets big. We invoice (with a for-real invoice) with the mailing. Every once in a while, if I get the sense that we're being stiffed, I make noise about demanding payment upfront but have yet to implement it.

We really make money on our photograph duplication service. The studio quality prints make money after the negative is made, the digital images we burn to CDs are total gravy. We charge a \$10 fee to digitize and depending on use, a user fee, i.e., \$10 personal, \$25 publication up to \$100 advertising.

Our Photographs Librarian this year had a great idea. We have a developer's lot map of a "new" 1908 subdivision for a neighborhood that is still charming and well regarded. Along with a period black & white photo and a 1915 colored postcard of the neighborhood, she packaged up a targeted letter complete with color thumbnail images, created an order form, and promised delivery by Christmas. This was mailed to about 72 residences, returned 12 orders and netted the Library \$560 prepaid. We plan to do this next year with another neighborhood. The three images are January's photo of the month, http://www.alexandria.lib.va.us/lhsc_online_exhibits/monthly/photo.html

We have a number of indexes (obits, naturalization petitions, census, high school yearbooks) online and make money providing prints from the sources.

The Stark County District Library in Canton, OH, does research by mail/email for patrons who live outside our county. We ask that local patrons come into the library for help with their research. We charge \$.25 or \$.50 for photocopies, depending on the paper size, and postage. Whatever this total comes to, we then round the charge up to the next dollar and refer to it as a "handling fee." This is done to compensate for patrons who "forget" to pay their bill. That way we don't have to spend our time reminding them.

This in itself probably doesn't bring in much money, but at the bottom of our invoice we put the following:

"PLEASE NOTE: If you wish to support the Genealogy Department, any money you send over the charges stated above will be used by the library to purchase genealogy materials."

Over the years, this has brought in a substantial amount of money, at least by my standards. I find that Genealogists are perfectly willing to help support us if they can be sure that any money they send goes to the Genealogy collection directly and not just into the general fund. In 2001, we received approximately \$2,500.00 that way. I don't know if that is enough to help you out or not.

Another thing we have done to reduce the time spent on each request, and thereby the cost of doing business, is to put fill-in forms on our website for the major records we have in our collection. The patrons can fill in the blanks about the record they want and just click send. That way we can be fairly sure of getting the information we need from the patron. We used to spend a lot of time writing back to get more info. or some clarification.

To view our website, go to www.stark.lib.oh.us/gene.html and then click on "Request Forms" near the bottom of the page. There are four full time staff members in the Genealogy Dept. and in 2001 we averaged about 500 letters/emails a month. There is no way we could handle that kind of volume with out those request forms.

I hope some of this helps. Good luck.

It seems to me that a potential pitfall here is charging only for a certain kind of search, i.e. genealogy. If your policy-making body decides that any question which takes over X amount of time will be charged for, that's one thing (and raises more issues we won't go into here).

However, if you charge for only one kind of question, "genealogy", who sets the limits and how much do you argue with the patrons about their motivations? As a random example: is looking for information on the life of a well-known businessman in your town ok when it's done for a reporter or student, but not when the patron happens to be a descendent of that businessman? Our town was the site of a very famous strike which has been the subject of articles, non-fiction books, novels, dissertations -- the gamut of writing. We frequently get questions about individuals involved in the strike. Again, is this genealogy? As a graduate student in history, I was once turned down by a library when I requested some biographical information because they did not answer "genealogy" questions.

If budget and staff constraints mean you can't spend more than a certain amount of time on a question and/or have to charge for research (beyond copying and mailing costs), why treat one question differently from the next one that comes in? Something to mull over.

Dear Larry and all:

Mid-Continent Library charges for photocopies within the library -- 10 cents for film/fiche and 15 cents for book copies. We own our film/fiche copiers and lease our book copiers. For letter and email queries we charge 15 cents per page for any copies generated. Often, if it's just a few copies, we say "Photocopies in the library are 15 cents per page. I am not charging you for this service, but donations are gladly accepted." This will often bring in checks of \$10 and more for copy costs of less than \$1. Donations are put into a genealogy endowment fund which was established a couple of years ago. So far we have not had to make use of the fund.

Dear Rhonda and all:

We recently replaced two regular Minolta 603 fiche reader/printers with two digital film/fiche Minolta MS 6000s. I did not have a say in what the staff would have liked, so our director purchased a small screen. If you have the option choose the 11x17 screen. Our printers will print 11x17 and 8 1/2 x 11 copies. Patrons have no problem using the printers as long as they are using fiche. We had to make an additional purchase of the smallest lens (9x/16x) to be able to make microfilm census copies. Even then we have to use the shift/reduce function to get all of the census on one page. I had a staff member check each census year and put a cheat sheet on one of the printers to show how much to reduce for that census year. Bottom line, we get great copies because every time you change the toner cartridge in the laser printer you change all of the moving parts that can go wrong on a regular reader/printer, BUT, all

the bells and whistles involved in the new reader/printers require MUCH instruction.

To follow up on Bob's comment, the Minolta PS-7000 is indeed the overhead scanner. We have one of those too (thanks for bringing this one into the conversation, Bob). It costs about \$15,000 and only does b/w and 8 bit greyscale and the maximum resolution on it is 400 dpi. It is WONDERFUL for what it does, especially the book cradle for bound items and removing the curvature to compensate for really thick open volumes when you want to scan both pages in a single image. It is also just the thing for the smaller, flat item that is so very fragile you don't want to stress it even more by manipulating it onto the flatbed. The max size item it will scan is 17" x 23" which does a lot for our larger measured drawings, maps, and folio sized materials.

We respond to E-mail or other written communications. For reference questions, such as looking up an obit when the approx. date is known, looking for marriage records when date is known etc., we charge .10 for letter and legal size and .50 per copy for 11 X 17 paper plus postage.

If we do research for people, such as look for an ancestor who was supposed to be in our area around a particular time, or do preliminary research on a local historic building, we charge a flat fee of \$15 for in state and \$25 for out of state. We do not limit based on time because for some areas and some time frames we have much more information than for others. The fee includes copies, list of what sources were checked even when source yielded nothing. In essence for that fee, we provide the raw data, but do not analyze it or synthesize it. If we find lots and lots of material, we may ask for additional copy money. This does not mean that we sit down and read county histories to get leads. We look in indexes, and records we may have for the people in question.

We will not do family trees or make the connections to link people. We will locate and copy what we have and send to patrons. We also provide a link on our Web page to local people who will do extensive research.

The state library here in Texas offers Genealogy & Local History Online through its TexShare program, free to Texas libraries. G&LH was from ProQuest which was supposed to become HeritageQuestOnline in December 2001, with the promise of adding scanned census images along with Revolutionary War pension applications, Freedman's Bank records, and others to be added later.

One of the responses included the term "vaporware" for online products promised but not yet received. Are any of you basing your decision on the likelihood of the "vaporware" becoming a reality? Obviously, price is the overriding concern, but are promises of what's to come good enough to sway your decision?

Among other things, I support the electronic reserves system at the Duke University library, which means we scan vast quantities of multi-page documents. We use Adobe Acrobat Capture, which is conveniently set up for batch processing. It's kind of pricy, though, and requires you to purchase hardware "page packs" for every 20,000 pages you scan. (With the newest version, it only counts pages that you OCR.) Adobe Acrobat can do the same things as Capture, but with more manual intervention, and it's a lot less expensive. Acrobat includes a "Capture plugin" to do the OCR.

I've also used Textbridge Pro at home for scanning & OCRing multi-page documents.

Dear List,
An interesting question recently arose, the commonsense answer to which seems obvious--but in life, what is obvious anymore?

Our library has in its collection microfilm copies of naturalization papers for Wood County, Wisconsin, microfilmed by the LDS and the Wisconsin Historical Society from originals previously located at the Wood County (WI) Courthouse and now located at the Wisconsin Historical Society's UW-Stevens Point Area Research Center. FYI only, I've appended a list of the reels and contents at the end of this letter.

The Wood County Clerk of Circuit Court was recently notified by the INS

that an individual who had become a citizen in Wood County, Wisconsin in 1955 has recently lost her citizenship. The Clerk forwarded me a copy of the INS' letter, that indicates name, date of naturalization, and certificate and petition number.

As a repository of a copy of the record--we don't own the originals nor are we the official record keepers--do we have any responsibility to retain or incorporate this additional information? Would state record retention laws apply because the records were collected at a county level? Or would federal law also apply since citizenship applies federally?

I haven't researched this deeply yet, and don't expect anyone to--but if you have been faced with a similar experience, I'd be interested to know. Otherwise I have ideas how to proceed. Thanks!

If you had a microfilm of original marriage records, I don't think you'd be *obligated* to keep copies of, or keep track of, any divorce records that might exist (which legally rescind the marriage contract). But, in my opinion, additional records are always good.
