The Genealogical Librarianship certificate is new, so no one can have taken it yet. However, I have taken other courses through the National Institute for Genealogical Studies. They are very detailed and you will learn a lot. They're done online at your own pace, whenever you have time, and most courses last between six and ten weeks. I noticed that the Librarianship courses cost more than the regular courses (for example, in the Canadian Research certificate).

They also often sell the course material in book format, which is cheaper than signing up for the course, but you don't get the benefit of reading other students' comments or interacting with the instructor. And I'm not sure if they're going to publish the Genealogical Librarianship course material as books. The books are sold through Heritage Productions, and the website is <http://www.genealogystore.com/eng/gstore.html> - as of today, there are no listings for the Librarianship books. If I find out whether they are or aren't going to sell the course material as books, I will let the list know. It could be a less expensive alternative.

The 1994 edition brought the patriots listing current through 11 October 1990. I anticipate that the same will be true of this edition, that it brings it current through 2000 or so.

How can we provide our customers the most up to date Patriot listings? One of the ways that I do it is to keep a notebook of

articles from the DAR Magazine now titled American Spirit Daughters of the American Revolution Magazine. The articles I keep are the New Patriots, Updates and Corrections as well as the listing of marked graves.

If you do not have a current subscription to American Spirit talk with your local DAR chapter. I have two subscriptions. One for the customers and one for the staff to read and then to clip.

If you can not afford the price of new Patriot Index ask your local DAR chapter to order you one as a gift. This item makes a most handsome memorial gift from the local chapter.

Additional commentary must be included to mention records in storage, access time frames and collection information in full that is not available upon library entry. Other FH Centers, libraries and genealogical collection depositories could use similar online applications.

While attending a genealogy session during ALA Mid-Winter in Philadelphia last January, it was brought home to me that to assist users effectively as a genealogy librarian often means not only leading users to materials containing the information they seek, but also helping them **problem-solve and interpret** in areas of immigration, passenger lists, census, land

records, etc. This is something we may not normally need to do in general reference; and the skills needed to provide this for any particular genealogical resource may not have been picked up by simply learning about the resource for ourselves.

Although other topics are covered, three of the ten core courses listed on the website pertain to direct user support. One would think that one would keep in mind and apply principles learned in these courses to other subjects taken during the course of study. Having this focus, we may improve our ability to assist the genealogist who needs our librarianly attention.

I think this particular approach will be very useful for someone practicing genealogy librarianship, as opposed to those (including librarians) working toward becoming certified genealogy professionals or just taking courses to advance their own genealogical research and knowledge.

I am seriously considering, and am examining my budget ; -)

Ms. Perron is Content Specialist with the Canadian Genealogy Centre Project of the Library and Archives of Canada and brings over twenty years of archival experience to this presentation. Having held numerous positions in her chosen field, she has authored many articles on archival matters, as well as a column for a French -language newspaper and radio spot for the French language service of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The speakers will conclude their presentation at 9:30 AM and will be followed by the Genealogy Committee Business Meeting from 9:30 AM until 10:15 AM. Please plan to join us and hear these two speakers provide us with a Canadian perspective on genealogy.

** The First 62 Years of the Brooklyn Eagle Newspaper Available

The Brooklyn Public Library has set up a digitized archive of the first 62 years of the Brooklyn Eagle, a leading newspaper of the borough of Brooklyn in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The site is located at <http://eagle.brooklynpubliclibrary.org> .

When you first visit this site (and by the way, I found using IE brought the best results; I could use it with Opera but only a little bit) you'll get a popup warning you that the site is still in beta-testing and is not yet available for use by the general public. I personally had no problems using it; your mileage may vary. It's expected that the resource will be made generally available in the "summer of 2003."

Once you're in the site, you have the option to explore via browsing by date or searching by keyword. Browsing by date was very straightforward. Pick a date (between 1841 and 1902) and you'll get the front page of the newspaper with icons at the top of the screen to browse through the rest. As you run your mouse over the paper, paragraphs will show up in blue. Click on the paragraphs and an enlarged version of the paragraph will show up. Click on an article title and the entire article will appear, enlarged, in a popup window. There you'll have the option to e-mail or print the article.

The keyword search is much more extensive. Here you'll have the option to search by keyword across the whole archive or within a specified date range. You'll also have the option to search within a specified group -- articles only, pictures only, ads only, or all three.

A search for "suffrage" over the entire archive found over 7000 results. Search results are presented eight to a page and include the date, the issue number, a graphic of the excerpt, byline (if any) page, and word count. Check out the small icons at the bottom of the first column of the table of results. From here you can look just at the preview snippet that appears in the results, view the entire article, view the page from which the article came, or add it to "My Collection" (I found the collection thing didn't work yet when I used it.) When you look at excerpts your keyword will be pointed out with translucent highlighting

and an arrow. I found some of the OCR to be incorrect, but not so wrong that I wouldn't spend approximately ten weeks digging through this archive.

If you're not interested in searching or browsing by date, you can also browse selected topics, from Advertising to Women and Woman's Suffrage.

The first article I read about this project said it was funded with a \$239,000 grant from the federal Institute for Museum and Library Services, with matching funds from the library. I am in awe. I found the searching fast, the interface friendly, and the mechanisms for getting close-ups of the articles and article excerpts very quick. Brooklyn Public Library, I salute you. These are beautiful archives.

If you have the financial means to bind your journals, and purchase the PERSI (Periodical Source Index) CD-ROM, you will offer your patrons a vast information source they should be exploring. The key is the index that makes the information more accessible.

We have also opted to purchase some titles in microform (film or fiche) when we had big gaps in our print holdings. We found the savings in not binding them and in shelf space (always a factor), offset the cost of the microform format.

Jill,

Our library doesn't have any policy that restricts children from any section of the library. (The one exception, not quite the same thing, is that children under 12 must have an adult with them at the computers outside the Children's area.)

We do have our genealogy and local history collection in a separate unstaffed room, but anyone can just walk in there and use it and students frequently do. It gets a lot of use during the 4th and 6th grade required "North Carolina" assignments. Also we have had students with a family history or heraldry assignment and a couple of teenagers doing genealogy as a hobby or for a scout badge.

As long as they're behaving in a sensible manner, I would encourage youngsters to take an interest in genealogy and local history. They're your future voters and taxpayers!

We have some basic books on genealogy in the circulating collection in the Children's area (see <http://www.glrll.lib.nc.us/genbegin.htm> -- the call #s beginning "j") and I wish we had more local history materials suitable for younger readers.

Another recreational activity here with the kids is to look at the microfilm of the local newspaper. The "day I was born" is a popular choice as is "100 years ago". Some local murders are also hot topics.

When I somehow picked up the idea of "family trees" at age 12 or 13, our small local library provided me only with Doane's Searching for Your Ancestors and the DAR magazine -- neither particularly relevant to a kid whose ancestors from Ireland and Sweden landed here in the 1890s and early 1900s. But I read them avidly and, obviously, I've stayed hooked.

Perhaps there's a target audience for programs here?

Within that section, if you click on "more...", you'll get a list of city directories which is similar to that on Ancestry. However, within this list, highlight "City Directories of the United States, Various Time Periods and Locations", click on "Go", and a list of many more directories appears. The list includes a useful selection of early 20th-century directories. All directories are fully searchable. One search box searches them all, but the search can be limited. For example, to find all persons named Harris on Canal Street in New York City in the 1920 Polk's Directory, enter Harris Canal 1920 New York City in the keyword box, and voila.

The jdbgmgr hoax is almost the same as the sulfnbk (<http://hoaxbusters.ciac.org/HBmalCode.shtml#sulfnbk>) hoax in that it tells you to delete a program that was installed with Windows. jdbgmgr.exe is the Java Debugger Manager and does have an icon that looks like a Teddy Bear. It is not, normally, a virus. As with all executables, it is not impossible to have a copy of jdbgmgr.exe that is infected by a virus but that virus will be detected by your antivirus software.

Nominations are welcome and may be submitted, but the committee will also consider initiatives that fit its criteria but have received no nomination. To be eligible for consideration, a project must demonstrate or enable the highest standards of genealogical research in electronic form, and do so in an

innovative and replicable manner. The award is intended to recognize appropriate use of technology to achieve genealogical results; eligible projects must therefore present a worthwhile genealogical result obtained through technological tools. Displays of technological "wizardry" devoid of genealogical merit will not be considered, nor will pure genealogical content outweigh technological shortcomings.

Examples of projects which might fit these criteria are:

- * Electronic representation of original source documents
- * Electronic publication of genealogical research, including full source documentation
- * Cataloging of repository materials for electronic access
- * Collaborative efforts among societies, family history associations, or commercial ventures to increase the electronic accessibility of genealogical resources

Employees of NEHGS and their immediate families are not eligible for consideration for this award. Nominations may be sent to techaward@nehgs.org. The deadline for submissions for the 2003 award is July 15, 2003.

The DAR Patriot Index is a must purchase.

That said, it is very disappointing that they combined all spellings of surnames that appear to be similar but are not. This is a helpful feature when the varieties are of the same basic surname: Smith, Smyth etc.

When this new edition was prepared the surnames could have been easily checked to see if they were the same name before combining them under the "approved" spelling. Sorting through the dozens of John's or William's adds alot more work for the researcher. In future editions it would be great if the compilers/editors could double check and include the actual spelling used by the

veteran
or DAR member.

For example. I am the historian for the Huse Family Association (descendants of Abel Huse 1602-1690). In recording all of his descendants from the early 1600s I have yet to find one family that changed their surname spelling to HUGHES. These are two distinctly different surnames. However, in the DAR Patriot Index they are combined...but since the Index drops the actual spelling you have to sort through all the HUGHES variants to find the HUSE individuals who served in the Rev War. Keeping the spelling would let researchers interested in the HUSE family go to those listings without having to sort through the unrelated HUGHES family.

Again...it's a "must purchase" for all genealogy libraries. I would just suggest that they update their indexing in the next edition.

I have to say, that I am amazed that ANYONE involved in American genealogical research would question whether the DAR Patriot Index was a "viable" purchase! Sure there have been mistakes and problems with some information over the years, but what genealogical database and book doesn't have those sorts of things? The DAR's records are NOT only related to the period of the American Revolution and never have been.

Insofar as the old Lineage Books are concerned, WE don't accept them as proof of anything. There have been decades of changes, updates, new information, etc. Our genealogy department only uses them as clues. DAR records extend far beyond those Lineage Books, but unfortunately, people tend to only look at those and think that's it. We've tried for years to get that message out, but only if librarians make their patrons aware of the situation and the value of the Patriot Index itself will this message spread.
