The Gastineau books appear to cover a French-Canadian-American family. The counties that seem to be mentioned most often are Greene County, Indiana, and Pulaski County, Kentucky.

The Index and Gastineau III are in very good condition. The 1973 Gastineau book is rusty (where there were staples and paper clips) and has some foxing. The General Register Office (GRO) in England has announced that a contract has been signed to digitize the birth, marriage, and death certificates that start in July 1837. For more information see http://www.gro.gov.uk/gro/content/news/Dove_contract_signed.asp

These are crucial records for finding and documenting families. Indexes are available on film or fiche in select libraries. Searching is tedious because each year has four A-Z indexes, one for each quarter of the year. A recent online project, FreeBMD, is a quicker way to search an index but is not complete.

Certificates are not available to the public and have to be purchased through the General Register Office. A "green paper" - requesting that certificates be released to the public - was submitted to Parliament more than 15 years ago. It is good news to hear that the GRO will make them available.

We do have Ancestry Library Edition and it is extremely popular, with the drawback that it is for in-library use only.

Heritage Quest is available to libraries as a remote database, but I don't think we'd choose it, as we are located in Canada, and it primarily focuses on U.S. resources. Our patrons do have access to U.S. census indexes and images through Ancestry, and although I know that there is some value to having Heritage Quest as well, since the census records were scanned by a different company, I'm not sure that this would add enough value for our patrons to justify purchase.

Can anyone recommend other subscription genealogy databases (perhaps British Isles) that are available to libraries and that can be made available to patrons through remote access?

I'd like to find something specifically genealogical, as opposed to something like the Times Digital Archive (which we have).

Linda Hasting writes: "I have a hard enough time dealing with reality than subjecting myself to an imaginary life."

While the name "Second Life" might suggest an imaginary life, the truth is that Second Life is nothing more than a new communications tool. For those of us who remember the earliest days of online services such as CompuServe and America Online, we remember having "screen names" that were used to exchange e-mail and instant messages and to participate in chat rooms. Just as each of us has one or more phone numbers that represent us, and one or more e-mail addresses, the 3-D representations in Second Life are just another digital representation of ourselves that facilitates communication.

As genealogists and librarians, we spend nearly every day "going" to web "sites", as if web sites were actual places and as if we were actually moving somehow to reach them. And we don't give it a second thought that we're using "going" and "sites" for things that aren't exactly physical. Second Life uses the same metaphors, although the 3-D imagery causes it to more closely resemble its physical counterpart.

In Second Life, you will find a re-creation of the New Orleans Saint Louis Cemetery Number One. Any genealogist with enough time and interest could re-create their favorite local cemetery in Second Life, giving those who can't easily travel to the real cemetery the opportunity to visit the re-creation and get some idea of what the cemetery looks like. And in Second Life, the virtual stones could be linked to actual photos and to web pages that document the lives of the deceased.

Second Life won't be for everyone, just as not everyone is into creating web pages or using electronic mailing lists. But it joins our repertoire of communication tools that let people (such as genealogists and librarians) communicate with each other.

If you are looking for a West Virginian, soon you will be in luck. Our Veterans Memorial has panels carved with the names of servicemen and women who died during 20th century wars. (I won't go into the history of how the names were collected and verified for the initial carving, or what may be done for 21st century wars.) There has been one subsequent carving of missed names, and an on-going database now online that includes names "to be carved" and to be corrected. We have accumulated so many additions and corrections that the current plan is to "scrub" and re-polish the panels and totally recarve all the names.

In a last great effort to get it as correct as possible, the staff of West Virginia Archives and History/West Virginia State Archives is combing newspapers from around the state for each specific period of combat service (as determined by the federal government) to pick up soldiers and sailors who qualify but whose names were not listed as West Virginians in their final military record, or not submitted by their families, veterans groups or local historical organizations, etc. This way we are picking up those who were missing in action (MIA) and the dates they were later declared dead, usually a year and a day after the date they were declared MIA. Local news reports include a lot more personal information than you will find in military records, of course, so we have found much valuable and interesting information to put in our database. We have been on the lookout for reburials for years as we search obituaries requested by research letter, or look over the shoulders of patrons, and staff has routinely copied these notices when we find them and turned them in to the Veterans Memorial Archive staff. If we find a mention of a memorial gravestone or tablet for persons for whom there was no body brought home for burial, we record that also. The Veterans Memorial Archive staff has combed the American Battle Monuments Commission Web site for burials or memorials (such as for those lost at sea) in U.S. military cemeteries and other military cemeteries in or outside the United States.

We have been picking up many more people that qualify for inclusion on

the Monument because the local papers carry reports of those who moved away from WV but whose relatives and friends still lived in the community and passed the information on to the newspaper, or people who fell through the cracks of the various official lists for a variety of reasons. To qualify, an individual must have been born in WV or lived in the state at least six months, and died from any cause within the official specified dates. We include merchant marine as well as the women who served in ways now recognized by the Veterans Administration as military service. We think many people did not realize that any cause of death was accepted, not just "killed in action" and deaths while on duty (training accidents, etc.), and we have picked up names never submitted before of those who died by disease, car accidents while on leave, and by suicide.

Our Web site also includes a section on the "Hellships of World War II," those ships used by the Japanese to transport POWs. Not only were conditions on the ships horrific, but the unmarked ships were attacked by Allied forces who did not know they were carrying POWs.

We are fortunate to have a Veterans Memorial Archive (although funding for any government agency is never a sure thing) to research, compile and preserve this information, and to make it available online. We also invite family members to donate originals or copies of photographs, letters and other documents for inclusion in their relatives' files. Browse through the Biographies section that includes these materials and biographies written by family members.

The newspaper reading project is very time consuming and is putting a great burden on our staff (and a couple of volunteers), but since the results will be literally engraved in stone, we determined to follow through. We are committed to honoring and remembering all who have served and died in the course of that service. We are trying to flesh out the bare bones of service records so that researchers and family members alike will have a real sense of who these individuals were in their lifetimes.

Take a look at the Web pages for the West Virginia Veterans Memorial (<http://www.wvculture.org/history/wvets.html>), and the Veterans Memorial online searchable database (<http://www.wvculture.org/history/wvmemory/wvvetmem.html>). I think you will be very impressed. I know we are very proud of what has been accomplished.

Thank you Donna for your response and thoughtful insight.

Regarding: The high cost of gathering genealogy data on World War II Deceased.

Yes, your premise is correct. The U.S. Navy repository which archives data did supply 12 searches, gratis. It was somewhat slow but helpful.

To search, say 1,000 records might take more time than most interested WWII veterans have left to live. My research data base is greater than 3,600 records.

However, a volunteer project may accomplish a good portion of the task, provided the records would be made available. The National Archives in St. Louis has refused access to records by this volunteer. The U.S. Navy archives at Millington, TN appears adamant that funding, up front, is required and without a commitment to performance or delivery per any schedule.

Basic data, such as date and place of birth of deceased WWII men and names of

parents appears to be guarded, with fervor by these agencies.

The dilemma exists. Perhaps the problem of gathering important genealogical data from government sources will go away as interested World War II veterans fade into obscurity.

I think indexes can be copyrighted. Publishers who would do the work of adding an index to a book in the public domain would have copyright protection on the index, at least.

We have some older titles, mostly county histories, that members of our staff have indexed as a matter of self-protection at the Reference Desk, I think. The indexes are cataloged with the same number as the full book, with "INDEX" added to the last line of the call number, then a label stating "Index in separate volume" is added to the full book.

We also have some local/county histories and county census transcriptions that were not indexed originally, but were indexed later by local societies who did well selling the indexes for a few years. We also cataloged these as described above.

I also strongly agree that all non-fiction books should have indexes, and the indexes should include geographic names and major event references as well as individual names included. We have a lot of books, both new and old, that only have name references in the indexes, when a lot of times the patron is searching for a specific town or county, not just a family.

I promised myself that I would not enter into this fray, but someone made the mistake of wondering what publishers would have to say about it. Largely because I agree that an index is a very important part of any genealogical book I don't think we are the culprit, but we do and will continue to publish books that sometimes will not contain indexes.

That said I would like to add some points to the conversation.

1) If you draw and quarter all of the publishers who fail to create an index for a book, you will have no publishers left, eventually.

2) As I watch many genealogical publishers going out of business, cutting back on production, laying off employees, and like me, just generally trying to weather the current storm, I am reminded that the reason that I live in this stress, is GREED. Yep, that one word would sum it all up.

3) If an author brings you a book and refuses to index it the publisher has three options, publish it, reject it or pay someone to index it. We provide our authors who will not index a book brochures from indexers, but still some refuse to do it. If I pay someone to index a work I can forgo publishing two to four other books that month. And those four have indexes. The question I have to ask is if this work should be available even though it does not have an index. For every one person that says a book without an index is not worth doing, I can find you five that appreciate that it is in print.

3) The advice that the one can make more money from an indexed book vs. an unindexed book is not something that I have ever experienced. Pricing of books is usually a function of print cost. So an index page is worth as much as any other page in the price calculation. So yes, more money can be made, but not enough to make up for the cost of indexing (which explains why we ask the author to provide the index, rather than do the indexing ourselves).

4) The advice that an indexed book is a better seller is also something that I have not experienced. I have a warehouse full of fully indexed titles that remain from the days when books were published in hardback and in runs of 500 or a 1000. Some have been in that warehouse or its predecessors for 15 years or more. In point of fact about 350 titles represent most of our sales, and of the 2253 we have in print last year, we sold less than 3 copies of 1,000 titles (Heritage Books has always had a policy of doing indexes so an index has, it would appear little to do with sales).

5) For those libraries who have determined not to purchase books unless they have indexes I am reminded of those who will not purchase books unless they are hardbacks. I have yet to see these attributes as a part of any collection management policy, but then I have only seen a few. I can understand that given that a book is available, one with and one without, the indexed version might be a better choice.

6) If you have a problem with a publisher, you should tell them directly. Having them wonder about why you don't order from them anymore doesn't seem to work, we come up with the wrong ideas instead of the right one.

We publish books with indexes, with some exceptions, and I don't feel like the culprit here, maybe I am. But I have to say this about indexes, they are a crutch that no real genealogist should rely on. The fact that something is not in an index does not mean that there is not information about the person of interest in the work. Personally, I don't trust them, I use them, but I don't trust them. And to my mind they are hardly a reason to deny your patrons access to a title. But the lack of an index is usually a reason for frustration for me, and I can understand it in others.

In short, it's a trade-off, as are most things in this world.

It's important that Craig and other publishers encourage indexing, but it's even more important that they stay in business. Of course the author of a new book can make the choice not to index; neither Craig nor I can force them, even if we think it is short-sighted of them.

Heritage Books published Brian Podoll's Prussian Netzelanders and other German immigrants in Green Lake, Marquette, & Waushara Counties, Wisconsin, for instance. I'm glad to have it, even though it has multiple sections (over 50!), which a patron must check separately.

But as an example of the reprint question, we bought French's Gazetteer of the state of New York in a 1980 reprint, then bought the later reprint with the every-name index originally done by Frank Place for the Cortland County Historical Society. The first one is useful if you know exactly where in NY they came from, the second is useful even if you don't.

The 1878 History of Winnebago County Wisconsin has been reprinted by both Higginson Books and Brookhaven Press. Brookhaven called to tell us they would be reprinting it. They didn't ask if there was any indexing, but I told them that an every-name index had been prepared by a patron who would probably allow them to add it. He was not immediately available--death in the family--and they just went ahead, despite the value they could have added. This is the attitude that drives me nuts. By the way, we have since put both book and index online.

genealogical repositories, such as libraries, to easily publicize their family tree holdings in a central location. Please see <http://www.FamilyTreeRegistry.org/bulkreg.php> for details about this feature called "Bulk Registration." You can publicize the trees without revealing personally identifiable information from them -- you can provide as little information as a descriptive title, though providing additional details, such as listing surnames, is recommended.

The Family Tree Registry is very different from most other genealogy websites because of its focus on privacy and its advanced search functionality. You can read about the Registry and the philosophy behind it in the January 2007 issue of Internet Genealogy magazine (www.internet-genealogy.com). Essentially, the Registry is a searchable annotated bibliography of family trees -- it does not contain family trees, but, instead, descriptions of them and citations of where they can be found.

I hope you will appreciate the usefulness of publicizing your family trees in a central location. Some repositories believe that their own indexing is sufficient, but it is impossible for a genealogist to search every repository's holdings separately, and many genealogists might be unaware of any reason to focus on yours. I hope you will help to create this resource.

** Registrations of unpublished family trees or trees from rare/out-of-print publications could be especially helpful to the genealogical community.

Our collection contains about 10,000 items.

We are open 7 days a week during the school year, 63 hours a week. During the summer we are closed Sundays, leaving us at 58 hours. Our hours are the same as for other services in our building. We try to have our service desk staffed all hours we are open.

Three full time staff are assigned to our department:
1 Librarian II with an MLS,
1 Librarian I with a master's degree in history, and
1 Library Assistant II with a bachelor's degree.
To fill in on the service desk during scattered hours we are not available (including Sundays and one evening a week), and to equalize our desk time with other library staff, we use branch adult services staff, including several librarians (MLS), and one Library Assistant II (has a bachelor's degree and is a Certified Genealogist). The adult services supervisor schedules our service desk coverage. We have been at this staffing level since 1994.

We also have a number of volunteers who create indexes and finding aids, conduct research, write articles for our electronic magazine, lead or help with programs, and do data input for our online local newspaper index. Our service would be much poorer without them.
