The Centennial Edition of the DAR Patriot Index is very out of date and should NOT be tossed. Of course nothing should prevent you from buying the Millennium edition. I have both and use both, although I start with the newer edition. There is unsourced information in the old index that was replaced by the new edition which may still be of value. After all, elimination of an individual from the index means what? That the data in the index is not any good. Maybe, not, it could mean just that this soldier does not seem to meet the requirements of providing the necessary proven service for an ancestor to belong to the Society.

An excellent example is Robert Glasgow, a fine man who served his country, but was unable to prove six months service, but applied for a pension anyway. The government determined that Robert Glasgow did not have "have six months service." and therefore his pension application was rejected. [See Report of the Secretary of the Interior, 16 Feb 1852, Sen Ex Doc No. 37, 32nd Congress, 1st Session]. Other choices in the report were:

Not on the rolls - no service given.

Not revolutionary service.

For further proof.

And my personal favorite:

No proof of service.

Now this fine man was not reported as not having service in the report, but someone decided, but not the government, but in a Society that considers someone giving a gun or a pot sufficient for membership, that Mr. Robert Glasgow did not meet the requirements of the Society since his pension was rejected for lack of service (service which the government says that he had, but not enough for a pension under the Act) and therefore his descendants were not eligible for membership in the DAR. A travesty for this patriot and his descendants.

But I digress. Mr. Robert Glasgow, b. 1749 in Ireland, died about 22 August 1839 in Ohio, m. Rosanna Uster, he being a Private from Virginia, found in the Centennial Edition of the DAR Patriot Index is not found in the Millennium Edition. Therefore, I keep both and use them both.

Servicemembers Missing From WWII Now Listed In Electronic Database

The Department of Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO) announced today that an electronic database listing the names of servicemembers still unaccounted for from World War II is now available for family members and researchers.

This new listing will aid researchers and analysts in WWII remains recovery operations. Prior to this three-year effort, no comprehensive list of those missing from WWII has existed.

This database, listing nearly 78,000 names, was compiled by researchers from DPMO and the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command. They used hard-copy sources including The American Graves Registration Service Rosters of Military Personnel Whose Remains were not Recovered from the National Archives II repository in College Park, Md., and The World War II Rosters of the Dead. Once transferred into electronic formats, they used computer programs to compare the two lists and determined possible discrepancies among the entries. These differences were then resolved using additional sources from the National Archives and thousands of personnel files from the Washington National Records Center.

After more than three years of research and coordination to transfer information into an electronic format, efforts to gather more data on unaccounted-for WWII servicemembers continue. New names and information will be added as historical documents and personnel files are located. The names of servicemen whose remains are recovered and identified in the future will be removed as families accept the identification and inter their loved ones in cemeteries of their choice.

FYI, the following article will be appearing in the June issue of West Virginia Archives and History News, current and back issues posted at <http://www.wvculture.org/history/ahnews/ahnews.html>. Be advised that this project is not a part of the recently announced LDS Church Records Access program, but predates it and operates under a different agreement (paid contract) where West Virginia State Archives retains sole ownership of the digitized records; however, if the WV Archives is ever unable to make the database publicly accessible, then LDS has the right to do so.

Your patrons in need of certified records for legal purposes will still need to contact the relevant county or state agency that originally issued the record to do so.

New County Records Added to Vital Research Records Database

The West Virginia Vital Research Records (VRR) database now has county birth, death and marriage records for Braxton, Cabell, Grant, Greenbrier, Jefferson, Lewis, Logan, Marshall, Mingo and Wood counties added to records of the project's original six counties of Calhoun, Gilmer, Hardy, Harrison, Mineral and Pendleton. While the original six counties' records included county birth records up through 1930-31, the birth records of ten new counties and all subsequent counties added online will include only birth records at least 100 years old or older, according to the year they are added to the VRR database. Birth records being loaded in 2007 will date through 1906. Not all records for all ten counties are currently online as the process of loading records onto the server is still ongoing. Continue to check back frequently for additions until all record types and years for all new counties have been loaded. Although records may be accessible during the week they are loaded, the search pages will update listings of available records once a week on Mondays.

The Web site is directly accessible at http://www.wvculture.org/vrr/va_select.aspx and is linked twice from the West Virginia Archives and History homepage, <http://www.wvculture.org/history>. One link appears on the lower part of the page under the "Explore Archives and History" heading as Births, Deaths and Marriages, and the other at the right-hand side under the "Latest News" heading of Vital Research Records. We highly recommend reading the explanatory article about the database before your first search.

If you find a transcription error in the index, such as a typographical error or apparent misinterpretation of the original handwriting on the record, you may submit a suggested correction using the "E-mail Here" link to wvrr@wvculture.org. If the actual record itself is in error, any corrections must be submitted to the relevant county clerk's office, or to the registrar of the West Virginia Vital Registration Office, following their guidelines. You may e-mail any questions and comments to this address also. Please let us know what state (or country) you are from for our statistics, and tell us if or how the database has served your needs.

I have borrowed some wonderful books from the Mid-Continent Public Library. Thanks for that service, Janice. Everyone should go look at their extensive circulating collection immediately (link below).

The Laramie County Library in Cheyenne, Wyoming will copy anything that doesn't violate copyright restrictions for \$2.00 per request plus 10 cents per page. I mail most requests but will fax or scan in and email under about 10 pages if requested. I send the (usually small) invoice with all mailings, emails or faxes. There is an additional charge for a long distance fax. I almost always get paid and frequently the patron sends the library a donation of a little (or a lot) extra.

I loan books for free within the state of Wyoming and charge \$18 for out of state requests. That's enough to discourage most out of state requests but not too much for those who really need something. I ask the out of state loan requesters to go through a local library of some kind.

Of course I won't lend everything. Books frequently used by my patrons, indexes to multi-volume sets, things that are really valuable, really rare or in poor condition aren't loaned.

For some reason I fairly regularly get requests for family histories that are available in full text on Heritage Quest. Then I usually just tell the patron or library ILL person where to get it and download it themselves (for free).

We have two Canon MS300. They are easy to load and operate, but be sure to buy the framing kit for easier printing. You can either use a kit to hook up through your intranet system and print to an intranet printer, or you can buy a stand alone printer for connection only to the machine. It depends on how your intranet system works.

The one real disadvantage is, because the microfilmed newspapers have an uneven appearance (dark and light on the same page) the automatic adjustment for light and dark when printing does not work well. The framing kit helps resolve this issue by allowing you to isolate just the one article you want printed.

Similarly, universities and others who are members of RLG are encouraged to adopt RLG's very liberal interlibrary loan guidelines, which include, among other things, "SHARES partners lend dissertations, theses, and other normally noncirculating material generously. Borrowers should attempt to locate a circulating copy before sending a request for material in a special collection or noncirculating collection. No per-request limit should be placed on the number of volumes or microform reels to be supplied."

I have to admit that I was surprised when this was first pointed out to me, as the option to ILL Special Collections materials had never been mentioned when I was in grad school studying medieval English literature.

Kathie,
I haven't done a multi-generational workshop but I always wanted to. Of course you probably have to aim the workshop to the understanding level and attention span of the kids. In addition to very basic family group sheet and pedigree chart stuff, I think since all the kids will have a parent or grandparent with them it's a perfect time to have them break into pairs (with their relative) and have the kids ask the elders some basic (and fun) interview questions. The kids can get practice interviewing someone (and taking notes) and the older person gets a chance to tell part of their life story to a kid that is motivated to listen. Maybe the kids can ask their elders about what life was like when they were in 4th or 5th grade? I think kids of that age usually are very computer literate and love computers, so if you can do some hands-on computer stuff, like having everyone look up a relative in the 1930 census, both the kids and adults will like that. I would definitely ask the adults to fill out a basic pedigree chart ahead of time (or at least to bring a name of someone who was alive in 1930) so they have some names to search. I'd

I taught a basic family history lesson to 8th graders, no parents involved. Obviously, they were more advanced than your 4th-5th graders in their research methods, but I don't think the teacher expected them to do a lot of deep research, mostly gathering information from parents and grandparents.

One of the things we did as an introduction was a series of questions to gauge how much they already knew:

Do you know your full name on your birth certificate?

Do you know your mother maiden name? (explain definition of maiden name)

Do you know your paternal/maternal grandmother's full name? (define maternal/paternal)

Do you know when your parents married?

Do you know where your father was born?

Each time, the kids would either stand or raise their hand (depending on the size of the class) if they knew the answer. I could see that some of them were really thinking about the question and pleased when they knew the answer.

We also worked on a short (4 generations) pedigree chart to get them started. I took some photos from my cemetery trips and family charts for them to look at. The teacher also showed her charts and tombstone rubbings from markers of her Civil War ancestors.

I am a Genealogist currently working on my Librarianship certification and I work in the local history section of a local public library - no one seems to be sure of what my compensation should be.

I work alone most of the time on organizational projects (before I came, nothing was indexed), teach and direct patrons in our Genealogy Club (I also

research new resources for the club) and give one on one instruction / consultation (30 minute sessions) to patrons and non-patrons evaluating their research during regular hours. I am also responsible for archiving / maintaining vertical files (newspaper, family histories, area older buildings histories, cemetery burial indexes, obituaries and maps). Occasionally, I conduct reference interviews to patrons who walk in off the street and need to know - or are curious as to what we have to offer. I also transcribe into Microsoft ACCESS obituaries and oral history interviews, as well as do town research and genealogical research for library special projects.

Is there a resource that I can access to help straighten this out? Is there anyone out there who does what I do? Do I fit into any special category or am I an anomaly?

Your compensation should be based on general library salary practices; the fact that you happen to be working in genealogy shouldn't alter the equation. You can find links to websites containing library salary surveys at:

You might also contact the nearest big-city library system and ask about their salary ranges for reference librarians. In my city, the position which is closest to your present qualifications and work assignments is called "Library Service Specialist", a reference position that requires a bachelor's degree in library science or a related field, but does not require an MLS. The salary range for this position is \$25K to \$32K per year plus benefits.

At the risk of stirring the coals yet again on a topic that has been discussed at length in this forum several times, I have to say that public and academic library salaries are abysmally low across the country, considering the level of education required and the level of autonomy expected. The fact that you are utilizing advanced computer skills, providing training, and doing specialized research - skills that would raise your salary in the business world - have no relevance in the library world. Most public library jobs are compensated based on the position level, with no scope for adjusting based on extraordinary skills that an individual may bring to the job. So while you may want to check with a local temp agency to see what your skills and experience in research, records management, training, and databases might be worth in an office job, it probably won't make any difference to the library.

Just keep telling yourself that you're not in it for the money, that you love genealogy so much that you'd do it for free, and that it's a privilege to be paid to have fun. And ask for additional indirect compensation in the form of time and expenses for trips to national conferences, serving on regional and national committees, giving talks to genealogy societies, researching and publishing articles, etc.

I have a question about minor naturalizations, that is immigrants who were minors at the time of their immigration who were eligible for "speedy" naturalizations if they met certain residency requirements once they reached the age of majority. (In other words, not the derivative naturalizations of actual minors).

A patron found two puzzling references in microfilm publication M1285, which is an index to naturalization petitions filed in county courts in eastern Iowa, northwestern Indiana, eastern Wisconsin, and northern Illinois. One naturalization, from 14 Oct 1884 says "Minor 12 yrs." Another, from 1898, says "Minor 10 yrs". I'm assuming that since these individuals are listed in the index, they are minor naturalizations, as opposed to minors who received derivative citizenship. I'm puzzled what the years reference. Does it mean that the individuals immigrated to the US at 12 and 10 years of age respectively? Or, perhaps that they have resided in the US for 12 or 10 years? Or perhaps something else?

I would appreciate hearing from anyone who might have some insight as to how to interpret this information.

My first thought is that perhaps, like some today, the minor was doing his 'intent' and even taking the oath -- and then doing the final steps upon reaching maturity - age 18 or 21. I do believe the # of years indicates age. Without some other answers, it will be hard to determine ---

* this was an Index to Naturalization Petitions has the patron followed through on the other steps of naturalization to see if they were completed.

Normally the process was/is

- . Declaration of Intention (first papers)
- . Petition (the court to become a citizen).

. Oaths of Allegiance, of fidelity and abjuration. (renunciation of birth country)

* what was the law at the time

* were these unaccompanied minors

* did it give any clue as to what country they were from

* did your patron read the preface/instructions at the front of that film for any explanatory notes

* what was found on the first census after those dates; were they with parents, etc.

In 2006 I presented an all day seminar on Immigration & Naturalization at the Angelina College Genealogy Conference. The outline is 22 pgs long. While it is an outline without my remarks or the Q&A, it still might be helpful in that most of the major laws are listed, etc. Anyone who wants a

I have a question about minor naturalizations, that is immigrants who were minors at the time of their immigration who were eligible for "speedy" naturalizations if they met certain residency requirements once they reached the age of majority. (In other words, not the derivative naturalizations of actual minors).

A patron found two puzzling references in microfilm publication M1285, which is an index to naturalization petitions filed in county courts in eastern Iowa, northwestern Indiana, eastern Wisconsin, and northern Illinois. One naturalization, from 14 Oct 1884 says "Minor 12 yrs." Another, from 1898, says "Minor 10 yrs". I'm assuming that since these individuals are listed in the index, they are minor naturalizations, as opposed to minors who received derivative citizenship. I'm puzzled what the years reference. Does it mean that the individuals immigrated to the US at 12 and 10 years of age respectively? Or, perhaps that they have resided in the US for 12 or 10 years? Or perhaps something else?

I would appreciate hearing from anyone who might have some insight as to how to interpret this information.

I was wondering if anyone could tell me if there are a list of standards for salaries for Genealogical Librarianship out there? I am a Genealogist currently working on my Librarianship certification and I work in the local history section of a local public library - no one seems to be sure of what my compensation should be.

I work alone most of the time on organizational projects (before I came, nothing was indexed), teach and direct patrons in our Genealogy Club (I also research new resources for the club) and give one on one instruction / consultation (30 minute sessions) to patrons and non-patrons evaluating their research during regular hours. I am also responsible for archiving / maintaining vertical files (newspaper, family histories, area older buildings histories, cemetery burial indexes, obituaries and maps). Occasionally, I conduct reference interviews to patrons who walk in off the street and need to know - or are curious as to what we have to offer. I also transcribe into Microsoft ACCESS obituaries and oral history interviews, as well as do town research and genealogical research for library special projects.

Is there a resource that I can access to help straighten this out? Is there anyone out there who does what I do? Do I fit into any special category or am I an anomaly?

>From the work that I did on Philadelphia naturalizations filed during the 19th century in the Philadelphia city and county courts, I can say that if a person arrived in this country under the age of 18, then all that he had to do was wait 5 years and achieve his majority at the age of 21 in order to file a petition. People filing minor petitions did not have to file a declaration of intention. I have seen where a father and son might go the courthouse the same day after waiting 5 years: the father has to file a declaration and wait an additional 2 years; the son, if he is over 21, can file his petition on that day. The Philadelphia records would often give the year of immigration. In one extreme example, Samuel Jenkins of Wales, filed a minor petition in 1870 claiming that he arrived in this country under the age of 18 in 1801.

What I suspect from your information is that the person either arrived in this country at the age of 10 or 12, waited until past his 21st birthday and filed a minor petition. The other possibility is that the person had already been in the country for either 10 or 12 years before filing.

I suggest that you check the ages of the two folks - the first in the 1880 census and the second in the 1900 census to ascertain more information which might solve this puzzle for you.
