Look at their site at <http://images.halinet.on.ca/> Our library has been using their software to index newspapers, but their software for displaying and indexing photographs is very impressive. We're already participating in a consortium level ContentDM database for our local history photos....wish I'd discovered the Canadians first. Halinet has provided their software FREE to the library with a very modest annual fee for storing our database. I've also found them to be exceptionally helpful with technical advice.

Pretty much any microfilm company now can digitize from microfilm. The quality of the resulting images depends on the quality of the microfilm; most folks prefer to use the microfilm masters rather than the copies that have been made for distribution.

That said, try Northern Micrographics (<http://www.normicro.com/>) and Southwest Micropublishing (<http://www.swmicropublishing.com/>). There are loads of other companies, but these two have a lot of experience with digitizing from microfilm, particularly with newspapers.

We purchased at ST200 Microfilm Viewer-Scanner in December and finally have it up and running. If your patrons just want to do the easy "ViewPrint", then it's a one button process. I'm in the process of doing pretty detailed instructions because it takes five buttons to turn on everything - and we don't keep it running unless a patron needs to use it.

There are three buttons on the ST200 itself, plus turning on the CPU and turning on the computer monitor. We purchased a large flat panel monitor and mounted it on a swivel arm at eye level above the ST200. Our sales rep told us it's one of the best set-ups he's ever seen. I have digital images if anyone is interested. I see staff doing the more complicated scanning processes, but 99% of our genealogy patrons will just want to print a nice, clear image.

Federal and state legislation that denies access to vital and other records by the American public to thwart identity theft is rooted in panic and misinformation. An excellent essay about this, titled "Identity Theft and Vital Records," is at <http://www.fgs.org/rpa/IDTheft%20Essay.doc> .

Congress is currently attempting to amend the Freedom of Information Act to increase the public's access to government information. The bill passed by the House is shown at <http://www.govtrack.us/congress/bill.xpd?bill=h110-1309> . A summary is at <http://www.govtrack.us/congress/bill.xpd?tab=summary&bill=h110-1309> . The Senate has not yet voted on the bill.

We have had this set up at Rochester since Dec. 2005. I find it easy enough to use, although there is a multi step set up required which isn't difficult, but can be a PITA sometimes when time is of the essence. The machine is great at capturing census images; also good at small areas of a newspaper or scrapbook (like an obit); and cannot capture a page of a newspaper at all.

At least, not in the amount of time that we have to use it. Patrons are on their own to use it. We only have one staffer to cover the entire floor, so we cannot sit there and handhold. If they are competent, they can use it, but as I just said they are on their own. It did hook up OK to the networked printing.

I agree. We catalog using MARC as well, with an in-house call number system based on location (for example, Ma 55-12 using Ma for Map, 55 is drawer number and 12 is folder number in that drawer). If your technical cataloging staff needs help, and if you want to avoid the hazards of physically giving them the maps to catalog, make up a fill-in-the-blank cataloging form and have non-cataloging staff fill in as much as they can: title (assigned if necessary, in brackets), author or responsible party, publisher, date, physical size, call number, and suggested subject headings, and notes if any. Most of our maps are not by standard publishers, indeed, many are hand drawn one-of-a-kind items, so catalogers are not going to find them on OCLC or LC, plus the maps are housed on a separate floor and have to be physically measured and assigned to an available drawer and folder ,etc., so the cataloging form method works well for us. Accession numbers and call numbers are pencilled on the map itself, and the map is foldered and set aside until actually cataloged. Once a map is cataloged, the typed label is taken to the map collection area, stuck on the waiting folder and the folder goes in its proper drawer.

Providing access through the web is excellent, but I'd still suggest using a standard metadata format rather than plain HTML. EAD is great, but you generally

need some special tools to convert the XML to a human-readable format, and it's generally more focused on the collection as a whole rather than the individual items.

Lots of folks I work with have created simple databases (in Access, MySQL, or whatever) with Dublin Core metadata for cataloging digital objects, including maps. If you're attached to MARC, you can come up with a subset of the fields you think will be useful, with the intention of importing the results back in to your catalog at some point.

Conformance to an interoperability protocol such as OAI-PMH can increase the access opportunities for search engines and other institutions. Sarah Shreeve's article in First Monday has a good overview of the subject:

Personally, I don't think simple Dublin Core is rich enough to describe something like maps fully, although qualified Dublin Core offers more options. There are lots of resources available for cataloging maps in MARC -- see http://ublib.buffalo.edu/libraries/asl/maps/cat/map_cat_tools.html for more than you ever wanted to know!

In the process of creating online finding aids using ARCHON for our collections, maps included. Collections will be described down to the folder or item level depending on circumstance. ARCHON also features a marc output that can be loaded into the local catalogue. As for or maps we have a electronic & print finding aid that describes our maps down to the item and this will be added to our database.

An example that we have done that is similar is the Abe Feder Collection, a collection of hundreds of architectural drawings of Broadway musicals. No one used the collection for over 20 years. Why? My guess is because the collection was trapped in our ILS. Who would have thought to look in Columbus, Georgia, then our institution, then our ILS for this collection? Once the online finding aid was created we received 10-20 queries a month for the collection.

I say don't get locked in the ILS or do not force your patron to find your ILS to find your holdings. Get out to where the patrons/customers are looking for the information and if that means something other than MARC then do something other than MARC. I am an advocate of preservation, creating intellectual and physical control, add you library jargon for metadata collection here... but if we are acting without one of our primary goals being to provide the greatest possible access to our resources then we need to look at what we are doing.

We have people register to use the Heritage Room and on that form I have 2 boxes that they can check. One to receive the Library's newsletter and the other to receive information of possible interest to genealogists and family historians/ I take the forms and enter the names into the mail lists. Sometimes people call and ask me to add them to the list because they have gotten something forwarded from someone else.

Since I have no clue as to how many addresses each group can take (nor do I really know what I am doing) I have multiple lists titled like Genealogy A-B, Genealogy C, etc. For the library's newsletter, I forward those names to our PR coordinator.

I try to remember to include a note to recipients encouraging them to forward and I try to send notices about all our events, as well as workshops, meetings, etc anywhere nearby. I also do national meetings and conferences so people will know about them and when they are. Somehow if someone from here know about them, they seem more doable. The other thing I try to include dis information on new databases, articles in new periodicals that they should read, etc. It takes lots of time, and generates lots of questions. but people seem to feel that because of the interaction we are reaching out to them.

I get comments from people all the time that they really appreciate the info and that it is helpful. Periodically, someone will email me that information has been helpful. Sometimes about a specific things I sent and they will tell me their success story. Other people ask to be removed because they just get too much email and want to get back in control.

As long as the feedback is positive I will keep doing it. I also try to compile a list for the next month's upcoming events including registration deadline for things that may be the following month. I try

to send this out the end of the month for instance I hope to send the list out for June on May 30 or 31. IF I have time, I try to send reminders copied and pasted from the master list each week.

We have had them for several years also, and have never had a theft or even considered someone might steal one. No one else around here has Minolta reader/printers anyway--other state agencies, law and accounting firms, etc., bring their film here to use ours. We do not have extra lenses to leave out, but the lenses are often exchanged between machines as different magnifications are needed, and often the lens from the least used machine is not replaced immediately and is left on the table for as much as a day. The single machine for staff use is behind a desk where the extra lens is not readily accessible, so we don't even put it in a drawer, just leave it by the machine.

In the process of creating online finding aids using ARCHON for our collections, maps included. Collections will be described down to the folder or item level depending on circumstance. ARCHON also features a marc output that can be loaded into the local catalogue. As for or maps we have a electronic & print finding aid that describes our maps down to the item and this will be added to our database.

An example that we have done that is similar is the Abe Feder Collection, a collection of hundreds of architectural drawings of Broadway musicals. No one used the collection for over 20 years. Why? My guess is because the collection was trapped in our ILS. Who would have thought to look in Columbus, Georgia, then our institution, then our ILS for this collection? Once the online finding aid was created we received 10-20 queries a month for the collection.

I say don't get locked in the ILS or do not force your patron to find your ILS to find your holdings. Get out to where the patrons/customers are looking for the information and if that means something other than MARC then do something other than MARC. I am an advocate of preservation, creating intellectual and physical control, add you library jargon for metadata collection here... but if we are acting without one of our primary goals being to provide the greatest possible access to our resources then we need to look at what we are doing.

It is not known, for certain, what Congress published during the early years of the Republic, especially prior to the 15th Congress (1817). Although many Congressional publications from the period 1789-1817 are reproduced in the American State Papers, an indeterminate number are not included, some of which are known from scattered individual library collections. Others appeared with historically significant textual variations from the officially reprinted versions in the American State Papers, or are known through contemporary newspaper or later secondary bibliographic citations. Still others remain undocumented, scattered in individual library collections, unbeknownst even to their collection managers. As a result of the burning of Washington by British armed forces on August 24, 1814, which resulted in the complete destruction of the Library of Congress as it existed at that time, this problem is all the more acute for these very early documents. Due to the pre-eminent importance of Congressional publications as primary sources of information concerning the early history of the United States, establishing a complete inventory of all Congressional publications from this period is a task of basic importance.

The 2007 GODORT Program, co-sponsored by the RUSA-History Section and the ACRL - Rare Books and Manuscript Section, will examine the origins

of this state of affairs, the mystery concerning what Congress published prior to the 15th Congress, the variability in the text of individual surviving publications, the consequences for librarians and scholars, and the implications for an understanding of the earliest American history. A presentation by August A. Imholtz, Jr., will address "pre-Serial Set" publications which are not included in the Gales and Seaton American State Papers, and the importance of examining individual library collections, to locate and identify otherwise unknown fugitive early publications of Congress. A presentation by Fred Beuttler will focus on one significant early Congressional publication concerning the "John Jay Treaty," and the historical repercussions for the longer term of the debate which it inaugurates. Finally, a presentation by Jessie Kratz will discuss early archival material and its implications for an understanding of early Congressional publications and related issues in the early history of the United States. These will be preceded by a Keynote Address by U.S. Congressman Rodney P. Frelinghuysen.

We at Allegan Public Library would appreciate copies of donation forms. Our newly-formed policy committee is writing and revising policy to cover acceptance, use, and the right to dispose of any donated materials that are no longer of use. This includes all items in the library, not just genealogical or local history materials.

This hasn't been much of a problem in the past for genealogy, but we have made immense progress in the last five years, and people are happy to add their contributions to our growing collection of family and local history materials. Often, things appear on my desk, put there by the circulation desk staff or by patrons. It is a happy task to try to keep up with the added materials, but a few older, donated items in poor condition and one or two newer items seem to have no logical place in our collection, or little connection to local people. I hesitate removing or adding these items, and I would appreciate knowing what is advised.

Much of what we have donated to us is in the form of short documents, bound family histories, or family history sheets. We do not accept valuable, original materials, as we are not an archival institution, have little storage space, and place items on open shelves accessible to use and theft by the public. We cannot put security in loose pages, though we do secure notebooks. We refer patrons to Western Michigan University for deposit of valuable and original documents, diaries, Civil War photos, etc. and to the local historical society's museum for artifacts with a local history connection. Other than bound materials, our donated items are usually copies we place in archival page protectors in three-ring binders. With the help of AARP trainees and a few volunteers, we are in the process of indexing almost all of our local history books, older cemetery records, directories, and other non-indexed materials, and this has also led to our evaluating some materials on our shelves.

People have been generous about loaning us older documents to copy. Michigan historian Larry Massie, also a patron, loaned us several older records, directories, and unique materials, as did the Allegan Old Jail Museum and a few local genealogists. Despite our major source of support being donations or copies of documents found and copied at other institutions, our collection has grown from a few shelves to several bookcases, and we have had only a couple of recently donated items that were marginal as to their usefulness, and caused me to question accepting them for our collection. Staff accepting donations sometimes have no idea who gifted the item, unless they ask for a receipt for tax purposes. I hope to find guidelines that everyone on staff may use.

Materials and Formats

Local & Family History Services currently houses many different material formats that relate to its purpose, including print materials (such as books, maps, pamphlets, periodicals, and unpublished documents), microfilm, online databases, CDs, DVDs, videos, and some photographs.

Going forward, printed materials will be actively favored for collection. These items have the longest life and hold up best under library conditions. In addition, certain items on microfilm such as newspapers and local area records will be acquired, and our historical newspaper holdings will be microfilmed if possible. Online databases, both departmental and subscription, will also be actively favored.

Due to their unpredictable shelf life and low circulation, CDs and DVDs will be less actively collected. Materials on CD and DVD will be added only if they fit into a high priority collecting focus and if an optical disk is the only format in which they are available and likely to become available. Materials on videocassette will be retained but, due to the lack of new materials being created in this format, will not be actively collected. Materials on microfiche cannot be viewed, will no longer be collected, and will be deaccessioned.

Periodicals (magazines, journals, newsletters, and family newsletters) present unique challenges for collection development. Our policy is to retain and bind only periodicals that pertain to St. Joseph County, surrounding counties, and Indiana.

Three-dimensional objects present difficulties and costs in terms of display space, storage space, lack of expertise, and preservation/care, and generally will not be added to the collection. Binders present similar challenges and again generally will not be added to the collection.

Free for postage we have the 1880 Cloud County Census Index. This book contains two indexes one general index that gives the township where the individual is located and one by township the gives Sex, Age, Status (wife, head of household etc) and the page on the census where they are located. This contains 15,080 different individuals and because the indexer is a native of the county she also added spelling corrections/suggestions as separate entries. These books were published the week the 1880 census went online. We have found errors in the online index strictly from the indexers not being familiar with the families in the area.

Free for postage we have the 1880 Cloud County Census Index. This book contains two indexes one general index that gives the township where the individual is located and one by township the gives Sex, Age, Status (wife, head of household etc) and the page on the census where they are located. This contains 15,080 different individuals and because the indexer is a native of the county she also added spelling corrections/suggestions as separate entries. These books were published the week the 1880 census went online. We have found errors in the online index strictly from the indexers not being familiar with the families in the area.

As the owner of a genealogy/local history bookstore that specializes in Minnesota and the surrounding area, my experience tells me that this is a very difficult task! The advent of new self-publishing software has made it possible for almost every person and organization to publish materials. While Park Books has been around for several decades, there are still genealogical and historical societies here in Minnesota who are unaware that we exist, and are willing to help them distribute their materials.

To try to stay on top of new materials, I subscribe to (and read) newsletters and mailing lists from many groups, ask customers to let me know of new materials, visit giftshops of museums and historical societies when I travel around the state, visit websites of organizations, etc., but know that I am unable to find everything. (For example, I don't even try to stay current with family histories, something that libraries often seek out.) I'm sure that the other regional-type publishers and bookstores do similar things -- your local genealogy groups will know who they are.

If your library has a mailing list or even a bulletin board, you might try letting people know what materials you would accept into your collection as donations, and what materials you are willing to buy. At least it's a place to start!

If your library receives newsletters or other periodicals from historical societies, museums, and genealogical groups all over Georgia, it would be an ideal job to assign to library volunteers, asking them to read each issue that comes in, looking for announcements of new publications. If volunteers could come in on a regular schedule, they could read each issue that is checked in before it is shelved. Or, each volunteer can be assigned a list of titles to read once a month after they have been shelved. Either way, there are extra eyes watching out for the items you want, and regular library staffers never have time to do this.. The volunteers could photocopy the ordering instructions, or fill them out on a form, and leave them in a basket for your review. Your local historical societies might be a good place to recruit volunteers who would enjoy enriching your library collections, and it would be easy and require minimal training. In fact, I'm going to suggest this as a volunteer opportunity at my own library.
