### FOR GENEALOGISTS

Part of the lure of family history is to find information about an ancestor's voyage to America and to identify his or her place of birth in the old country. The federal government has been collecting information about immigrants for many years. The former Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) and now the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS) are the focus of those collection efforts.

Zack Wilske, an historian with USCIS, will present "An Introduction to Immigration and Naturalization Service Records for Genealogists" at Bull Run Regional Library on Thursday, November 15, beginning at 11 a.m. This presentation will use case-study examples to provide an overview of federal records relevant to family history researchers. Have your patron check with any nearby university library which has a large map collection. There should be a microfilm or microfiche collection available which might cover the entire country. University Publications of America produced some microfilms with the title "Fire insurance maps from the Sanborn Map Company Archives" in the 1990s, and I had the impression that the Library of Congress produced a set of microfiches of the Sanborn maps in their collection. A checklist of LC's Sanborn maps is: "Fire insurance maps in the Library of Congress : plans of North American cities and towns produced by the Sanborn Map Company," published by the GPO in 1981; online version at:

Also to be consulted is "Union list of Sanborn fire insurance maps held by institutions in the United States and Canada" by R. Phillip Hoehn, 2 vols., 1976-77, updated online at:

To make it easier on me, I put together a beginner's kit that has a pedigree chart on the back. I tell them right up front, I am unable to focus (especially now that I am older) and/or retain all the information they have in their head. I need to see it written down on a pedigree chart. I do not beat around the bush. I give them the kit and any handouts and show them the table with a pencil. I will spend time showing them how to complete the chart. When I finally can make some sense of their ancestors dates and places, we talk.

I also created over 60 pathfinders on various subjects. Once I find out the area they are researching, I hand them a pathfinder.

I understand your problem. I usually start by asking them what it is they are trying to find. Often what they say they want to find isn't really what they are looking for. I just keep asking questions and it helps to narrow it down. Often they will have some paperwork. Usually it's not a pedigree chart for family group sheet but it helps me to see it written down.

It's usually the beginning genealogist that are the hardest to help. I just keep telling myself someone helped me when I was beginning and it helps keep me sane. We have a lot of the flyers the LDS church used which has a pedigree chart and tells how to fill one out. It helps them to understand the info that is needed to help them.

If someone calls in advance I always request that they bring in as much as they know written down. A lot of people think they only need to bring in a name. They don't realize they also need dates and places.

I often explain to them how our library is oriented and that our materials are grouped by subject ? marriage records, obituary indices, military records, etc. I also tell them that most of the information they're looking for is found by state and then by county, and try to get them to consider what kind of information they might be seeking for each ancestor. This seems to help people focus. In addition our policy is to give each new person a blank ancestor chart and advise them to work from themselves back so they are able to recognize each generation from the links to the more recent generation.

I try to get them to tell me the last documented time and place for the ancestor they are researching.? IF, I can get them to tell me that, it helps them focus and helps me pull the materials that are actually most likely to be relevant to their research.? Sometimes I have to politely listen to the family narrative which also confuses me, before I can get them focused.

Once they start finding stuff, then I can ask more questions based on what they have found that lets me stay focused on the things they are most likely to need.? I also tell them I can only keep track of one thing at a time when they begin with the barrage of questions.? I smile broadly and use my MOST drawly southern accent which people often assumes means we are dumb.? It seems to work.? ;-)

I also ask if they have family group sheets and pedigree charts with them so I can use those.? I will have to think about creating another piece of paper to keep up with.

Unfamiliar looking folks with bags of binders generally have a good grip on who and when they are researching in our area. We have a brochure which lists local sources they might not have discovered. There are a few things not digitized yet! But often these folks start by asking where the old newspaper on microfilm are. If they haven't already used our obit index online, we show them that, and let them roll. Then I wander by and look at what they're finding and what it suggests.

For beginners, we offer a brochure with a pedigree chart and sample family group sheet. If they already have a chart sketched out (names and maybe dates but locations are less likely), then my question is "Were they from this area?" If so, it's on to our local brochure, show them links to the obit index, cemetery records, city directories, census etc. If not, census will more likely be our first stop.

I don't want to make them copy over info onto a special worksheet for me if they already have it laid out in standard form. But that written version sure does help both them and me see where the gaps in research are.

The simplest thing to do is hand them a Pedigree Chart. We tell people that if they can get back before 1930 or 1940 then we can help them. Filling out the chart forces them to focus. Some of them even realize that they don't have enough information to get started, and they take it home and ask family members for help. If they are able to complete three or four generations then it makes it easier for us as well.

I do believe they are helpful. But I tend to forget to use them myself. They do have history and names that can help with research. They do have different information in each year. I'm not sure if they are online anywhere. Texas history and names are everywhere-online, in other books, and on microfilm. There can be duplicate information in the almanacs and other books and databases you already have. The almanacs can help with research on weather, sports, and other historical events during specific time periods. I remember John Phillip Colletta saying he used almanacs to help with writing his family history. He would find out the weather or other events during a marriage to fill in what was happening around the

event.

We have to sometimes remind patrons of the value of the books. Show them off in displays or talk about them on blogs. With you asking this question, it has stirred up some ideas for me. I forget to remind patrons of the "history" books that can help them with their research. They also count as Texana books. If you want to have a Texas collection, you probably should keep them. But yes, the information in the almanacs probably could be found in other books or online.
