We have been looking for a better master storage option, one that combine a few criteria: redundant backups and, especially, backup offsite (which right now we don't have), greater ease in retrieving image files, security, and--reasonable cost. We were just shown an option used by our city and county departments called Filebound, which does provide redundant cloud storage in different locations, plus various indexing and retrieval options, but besides the fact that virtually all its other customers use it for high-volume document storage and I'm not sure its tech staff really understand our particular issues, it would end up being pretty expensive for us--\$10 per gigabyte per month. We currently have close to 400 gigabytes, and growing.

What are other libraries with digital collections doing? I note that OCLC has an archive storage service, too--has anyone had any experience with that?

We've been doing some of that here. I started off using the Kodak gold CDs, but that got a bit tedious when working with large format originals which were 190-200MB when scanned, so I now have some Western Digital drives and a Seagate.

I am also using some 40GB and 80GB SATA internal drives from some retired computers which I hook up with a USB-to-SATA adapter. I wouldn't recommend this be your only backup, but for 3rd and 4th copies it works pretty well.

Moving up a level, my colleague who does the video editing for our discussion programs had a need for a large amount of space, and now uses a USB-connected dock which holds two 2-terabyte drives - something like this model:

The SATA internal drives which fit in the dock are relatively inexpensive. He adds about 15GB per week.

If that is not sufficient for your needs, you could look at the system NASCAR uses:

Elizabeth,

Do you already have a deaccession process that you follow or have a policy written up? I can give you a few examples of other archives I have worked in. I won't name names.

A large national museum archives: any paper archives not kept such as postcards are deaccessioned and destroyed. This is to deter intentional or unintentional theft by archivists and curators. (i.e. I would like to have this for my personal collection. Ooops looks like it doesn't fall into our collecting policy, so I'll take it home.)

A county public library: Because it was a county department, we were not allowed to sell items and use the proceeds. We had to give anything away or destroy it (postcards, photographs, papers, etc.). (If it was a book, it was withdrawn and given to the Friends book sale.) We did not have a formal deaccession policy, but were pretty limited in what we could do.

A different county library: This library is also a department of the county. They were much less restrictive. We were allowed to offer items to other libraries or we could also sell items and put the money in a line item for our Friends of the Library account. That money would be used to purchase additional postcards, etc. Items of little monetary value were usually given away to nonprofit entities. We were always careful not take things ourselves or to give them away to for profit businesses. We had a deaccession policy modeled after a local museum's policy. It was a blanket policy that covered photographs, postcards, etc.

I hope this helps.

We had a digitizing initiative that started in the late 1990s. After some ups and downs, I go to work closely with them and eventually supervise the department.

For the longest time there were backups only on CDs and then DVDs. And they were not refreshed at all. (Bad! Bad!). And when digital copies were ordered (from an online page) we had to hunt down the individual disks, copy the images to a computer and then copy those to another disk to burn the disk that was sent out.

At least now Dropbox is used to fill orders.

To continue, I got concerned that this was going on, and insisted that we have a major change in how things were backed up. At one time the whole collection was scattered onto the shelves of three different persons. The upshot was that I convinced the IT dept. that we had invested a great deal of time and effort in creating the images. The first step was to copy them to a separate drive in the library; the second was to have the collection backed up on the city's server; and thirdly, the IT dept began making nightly digital tapes of the collection and followed their normal procedure for offsite storage. There are some separate hard drives in house, but not many.

At the time I retired, there were about 10 terabytes of images; sounds like a lot, but not these days. And now they are backed up redundantly in several locations. Watchwords: keep this organized, give the images identifiable names which clue the user in as to what they are (maps, postcards, photos, manuscripts, etc etc). And no excuses. Back up!

We are lucky that a retired Kodak engineer does media conversions and backups locally, has a great liking for history, and has worked with several local historians. He was a great help when I talked to him about

various ideas.

Hope that this helps.

None was listed about 30 times.

Interesting and discouraging as to where we are going with our research skills. Are digital catalogs taking over the standard library catalog? Are schools no longer teaching library skills?

I now wished that I asked more questions.

Even though variously misspelled (or misread), some names reveal themselves in a alphabetical list on a page better than in an online search, especially pre-1850, when the surname can be the key data.

Personally, I think you should keep them, and that you should encourage people who can't find someone in the online databases to use the paper indexes. The online census indexes are chockfull of transcription errors. Some are obvious to more experienced researchers, such as mis-reading a 19th century "L" as an "S" or a double "s" symbol as a "p," but many beginners are using these records, plus are using them at home without any guidance from experienced librarians and researchers. Even our experienced staff researchers use the paper indexes for quick lookups and when online searches produce no or confusing results. Rarely, we even go back to the Soundex microfilm when all else fails.

The online indexes will NEVER be completely cleaned up. In fact, most user contributed "corrections" I have seen are just as or more erroneous than the original transcription errors. We work continuously just to clean up our own West Virginia Vital Research Records vital records database, a much, much smaller database.

We came up with a policy for deaccessioning items, which discussed books, media, postcards, manuscripts et al - the whole range of materials that were collected. The upshot was that the head of the dept. (me) had discretion up to a certain dollar amount of the decision to deaccession, but I had to follow some procedures to do so. Longtime readers of this list include many who availed themselves of our deaccessioning. Eventually items were given away to other libraries, other organizations locally (museums, historical societies, historians, etc), or were sold by the Friends group. Everyone benefited.

And once something is digitized many copies can be produced from it, for research and teaching. One of my retirement projects is digitizing 2000 postcards from Geneva NY, which are online.

Do you already have a deaccession process that you follow or have a policy written up? I can give you a few examples of other archives I have worked in. I won't name names.

A large national museum archives: any paper archives not kept such as postcards are deaccessioned and destroyed. This is to deter intentional or unintentional theft by archivists and curators. (i.e. I would like to have this for my personal collection. Ooops looks like it doesn't fall into our collecting policy, so I'll take it home.)

A county public library: Because it was a county department, we were not allowed to sell items and use the proceeds. We had to give anything away or destroy it (postcards, photographs, papers, etc.). (If it was a book, it was withdrawn and given to the Friends book sale.) We did not have a formal deaccession policy, but were pretty limited in what we could do.

A different county library: This library is also a department of the county. They were much less restrictive. We were allowed to offer items to other

libraries or we could also sell items and put the money in a line item for our Friends of the Library account. That money would be used to purchase additional postcards, etc. Items of little monetary value were usually given away to nonprofit entities. We were always careful not take things ourselves or to give them away to for profit businesses. We had a deaccession policy modeled after a local museum's policy. It was a blanket policy that covered photographs, postcards, etc.

I hope this helps.

The upshot was that the head of the dept. (me) had discretion up to a certain dollar amount of the decision to deaccession, but I had to follow some procedures to do so. Longtime readers of this list include many who availed themselves of our deaccessioning. Eventually items were given away to other libraries, other organizations locally (museums, historical societies, historians, etc), or were sold by the Friends group. Everyone benefited.

And once something is digitized many copies can be produced from it, for research and teaching. One of my retirement projects is digitizing 2000 postcards from Geneva NY, which are online.

We had a digitizing initiative that started in the late 1990s. After some ups and downs, I go to work closely with them and eventually supervise the department.

For the longest time there were backups only on CDs and then DVDs. And they were not refreshed at all. (Bad! Bad!). And when digital copies were ordered (from an online page) we had to hunt down the individual disks, copy the images to a computer and then copy those to another disk to burn the disk that was sent out.

At least now Dropbox is used to fill orders.

To continue, I got concerned that this was going on, and insisted that we have a major change in how things were backed up. At one time the whole collection was scattered onto the shelves of three different persons. The upshot was that I convinced the IT dept. that we had invested a great deal of time and effort in creating the images. The first step was to copy them to a separate drive in the library; the second was to have the collection backed up on the city's server; and thirdly, the IT dept began making nightly digital tapes of the collection and followed their normal procedure for offsite storage. There are some separate hard drives in house, but not many.

At the time I retired, there were about 10 terabytes of images; sounds like a lot, but not these days. And now they are backed up redundantly in several locations. Watchwords: keep this organized, give the images

identifiable names which clue the user in as to what they are (maps, postcards, photos, manuscripts, etc etc). And no excuses. Back up!

We are lucky that a retired Kodak engineer does media conversions and backups locally, has a great liking for history, and has worked with several local historians. He was a great help when I talked to him about various ideas.

Hope that this helps.

Over the past 8 years a friend and I have been doing genealogy classes at our two local libraries. I agree with Elaine about not labeling them as to skill level. The only ones we rate at all are our Beginner Genealogy which starts at the very beginning and helps them recognize forms, and locations of information they may have at home. Then we branch out to local sources. Every time we have given it we have repeat "participants" as they say they need a refresher.

During our introduction, we always ask the participants to give their name and years of researching. This helps us know what experience we are dealing with. We go into depth from answering the questions the participants ask. They are very informal classes and we encourage participants to ask questions as we go along. They often share ideas we hadn't considered, so we also learn every time we have a class.

This year we had a "Novice" class which we limited to just 8 students so we could give them hands on help. It was two sessions and the first one got them started with forms that we ask them to complete before the second class that week. Then we asked them to bring in their personal papers and we would individually help them get started with entering information on family sheets, pedigree charts, etc.

We have had classes on:

Organizing My Stuff (including heirlooms, documents, etc),
Using the Courthouse,
Introduction to Genealogy Computer Programs - with demonstrations of various programs,
Obtaining Documentation for Lineage Society Membership,
Ellis Island Research,
Genealogy Numbering Systems,
Using Timelines,
Local Sources (we had a powerpoint with pictures of various buildings within a two county radius and then asked the participants to identify them as to type (courthouse, church, museum, etc) and location),
Managing a Genealogical Project - what to keep and how to organize the documents

We schedule a month with classes one day a week for 2 hours and always end the month with a Workshop (2 - 3 hours)- Work on your own research where participants can bring their own laptops or use one provided by the library and access the in-library only websites to work on their own research.

They are always well attended and we see many of the people year after year. We also ask people from our genealogy society to help us with the classes, especially the Genealogy Program and the Workshop. Many hands make less stress.

A belated thanks to all who responded to my question about storing digital collections. Your input has helped us clarify our ideas on this.

Our library is putting in an additional server (for multiple reasons, but it comes at a good time!) where we can store our TIFFS for easy access, and we will keep another set on external hard drives off-site (still working on the exact set-up....and a system to make sure we keep track of them all). We do refresh them, and I'm happy to get some confirmation that this is still considered a good practice. We increasingly use Dropbox to fulfill orders unless the customer specifically requests a CD.

> We had a digitizing initiative that started in the late 1990s. After some ups and downs, I go to work closely with them and eventually supervise the department.

>

> For the longest time there were backups only on CDs and then DVDs. And they were not refreshed at all. (Bad! Bad!). And when digital copies were ordered (from an online page) we had to hunt down the individual disks, copy the images to a computer and then copy those to another disk to burn the disk that was sent out.

>

> At least now Dropbox is used to fill orders.

>

> To continue, I got concerned that this was going on, and insisted that we have a major change in how things were backed up. At one time the whole collection was scattered onto the shelves of three different persons. The upshot was that I convinced the IT dept. that we had invested a great deal of time and effort in creating the images. The first step was to copy them to a separate drive in the library; the second was to have the collection backed up on the city's server; and thirdly, the IT dept began making nightly digital tapes of the collection and followed their normal procedure for offsite storage. There are some separate hard drives in house, but not many.

>

> At the time I retired, there were about 10 terabytes of images; sounds like a lot, but not these days. And now they are backed up redundantly in several locations. Watchwords: keep this organized, give the images identifiable names which clue the user in as to what they are (maps, postcards, photos, manuscripts, etc etc). And no excuses. Back up!

>

> We are lucky that a retired Kodak engineer does media conversions and backups locally, has a great liking for history, and has worked with several local historians. He was a great help when I talked to him about various ideas.

>

We prefer microfilm and microfilm as much as possible. We are currently scanning and digitizing county records and other materials, but also producing microfilm

from the scans. We keep all kinds of hardware to play all types of videotape, film, audio tape, video and audio cassettes, you name it. We even have a one of a kind machine (I hesitate to call it a computer) that reads the magnetic tape on which certain years of records were stored. It was considered innovative and the wave of the future at the time it was purchased, but did not develop into common use.

Many companies, medical facilities and law firms have stored records on microfilm and microfiche, but did not keep the readers. We have people come in every few months to use our readers to find and print old records.

I would like to say that it depends on the skills of the library techs that are being hired. I had a career of 33 years as a library tech, in a public library, a school library, a scientific research library, and an academic library; and I also have a bachelor's degree from an accredited university. Just because the library tech job description doesn't require more than 2 years of college doesn't mean that is the actual level of those who are being hired. In today's job market, many overqualified applicants are taking whatever they can get; and employers in large urban areas especially can take advantage of this.

In the academic setting in which I worked, one of my assignments was to spend from 2 to 6 hours each week staffing the Government Documents reference desk. I had librarians with MLS degrees tell me how brave I was, and that they were scared to death of government documents reference!

Among my dozens of library tech colleagues, the vast majority had at least a B.A.; many had advanced degrees, and some even had an MLS. So yes, most library techs DO know how to use a "catlog."

Several years ago this became a hot topic here in Denver. So, instead of publishing a DPL list of researchers we refer folks to the Association of Professional Genealogists. What resulted was a few years of two lists. One maintained by non APG folks by a local fellow and the list from APG. Eventually a Colorado Chapter of APG was created and to be on the CAPG list you had to be a member of APG. Again, this resulted in the Library not being in a position of recommending nor endorsing any one researcher. You may check the CAPG list and the APG list and see that the Colorado Chapter is not representative of APG members in Colorado. Also, the local researcher who may be the authority on their home turf is not a member of APG, thus not a member of CAPG.

Bottom line, when a researcher calls from out of state I interview them to determine their geographic interest. I inform them of the APG website and to check with the local library and historical society in the corner of Colorado where their research is to take them to see if there is a list of local researchers.

No library should ever recommend a researcher to someone because that could lead to problems in a variety of ways if issues arise. Knock wood ? we've rarely had a problem from providing such a list, and the only thing I can remember in 30 years is complaints leading to removal of someone from the list years ago. We do not, however, post the list on our website.

The list is purely as a service to researchers who can't get here. We do not receive as many requests for the list as we did in the past, so perhaps people must be figuring out the others ways of finding a local researcher.

We also refer people to BCG and APG for other researchers.

Several years ago this became a hot topic here in Denver. So, instead of publishing a DPL list of researchers we refer folks to the Association of Professional Genealogists. What resulted was a few years of two lists. One maintained by non APG folks by a local fellow and the list from APG. Eventually a Colorado Chapter of APG was created and to be on the CAPG list you had to be a member of APG. Again, this resulted in the Library not being in a position of recommending nor endorsing any one researcher. You may check the CAPG list and the APG list and see that the Colorado Chapter is not representative of APG members in Colorado. Also, the local researcher who may be the authority on their home turf is not a member of APG, thus not a member of CAPG.

Bottom line, when a researcher calls from out of state I interview them to determine their geographic interest. I inform them of the APG website and to check with the local library and historical society in the corner of Colorado where their research is to take them to see if there is a list of local researchers.

Until this time the list was comprised of people known to do quality by the staff, including people who work in other local offices, who belong to the local genealogical society and former LH&G staff. Suddenly the list has become a hot item and we have more people than we really need that wish to be included for hire. We are feeling the need to create policy to cover ourselves in the event of a complaint.

Would those of you who have policies of this kind be willing to share them, and if so, what qualifications do you ask for? We are an offshoot of the reference department of a medium sized public library, and are unlikely to be able to demand that researchers be certified genealogists.

Our policy and experience regarding a researcher list echoes Eric's, except we post our list online. Some of the out of state researchers on our list have been offering their services for decades to West Virginia researchers. Others are newer and seem to be more ?commercial? than the individuals who researched for hire in the past. The only time we have had complaints and taken someone off the list is if a patron complains that mail, e-mail and phone calls receive no response in a

reasonable amount of time. We try to contact the researcher, and if we get no response or mail is returned, etc., we drop the name from the list. Sometimes the person is not able to accept new researchers or continue research for some reason, often temporarily, and the person has always agreed to be removed from the list with the understanding that they can request to be placed back on the list when they are able to fulfill requests again.

We include this statement on the Website Researcher List page:

The policy of Archives and History is not to conduct extensive genealogical searches. Our function is to make West Virginia historical data available for use in the Library at the Culture Center. The best way to investigate these resources is to visit the library.

If you are unable to come to Charleston, we suggest you contact people who will perform genealogical searches for a fee. West Virginia Archives and History does not endorse or recommend genealogical and historical researchers, and are not responsible for their work. The following individuals have submitted their names because they are available to perform research. Each researcher will provide information on fees individually when contacted. When you write to anyone on this list, it is recommended you enclose a self-addressed stamped business-size envelope (SASE) for a reply.

Their rules were in order to be added to submit a sample of your work along with 2 letters of recommendations (I believe the letters were to be from previous clients). Now, when we get requests for the list or if I enclose the list for patrons out of state, I always include this: "I have enclosed a list of researchers compiled by the State Archives of North Carolina. I cannot recommend anyone from the list, but I do know that in order to be added, researchers must prove their competency so they should all be reliable."
