If you use outside programmers, be sure that you do not get charged for adding more names. We did, and eventually had to do the update in-house. For a while we made 7000 dollars a year charging only 5 dollars a copy. Now they charge 15.

Trying to keep this terse! We in Rochester started doing indexing, but by typing into Word. That became progressively more of a hassle as the files got bigger. Eventually, after trying Filemaker as an online query-able database, we settled on typing the information into Excel and importing it

into Access. We had an outside company do programming for us, but after they started charging \$5,000 each time we wanted to simply add more names, that came to a screeching halt. We also started by having 14 people able to type names into Excel. Budget cutbacks eventually got that down to one person.

Eventually, we had our in house IT dept do a database. With an outside group that I am now connected with, we are lucky to have two professional programmers in the club who are very capable of doing such programming for us once we type up the information that we want to use.

Again, keeping this terse, the library would sell copies of the obits etc. for 5 dollars and we made 7,000 dollars a year on them, . Not a fortune, but it all helped. Now they charge 15 dollars each. Once you get a large enough database (we talked to Ancestry we we got over 1 million names, but our top management would not go for it), you could manage to make the information more discover-able. I have mentioned Beck Hill the the Rutherford Hayes presidential library in OH before. She would be a good person to talk with about this effort.

We already have the solution: It is your online catalog.

The other obvious tool is to go to the online commercial sites that have put up over 140 million obituaries (like America's Obituaries & Death Notices; or America's GenealogyBank - etc). The vendor sites put up millions more obituaries every month.

Between harnessing what the vendors make available and cataloging your own local sources into your own catalog, OCLC etc. we can provide real, in depth service to our patrons.

Hi Laura,

We are in the midst of indexing our collection of obituaries, thanks to two detail-oriented volunteers. Our Obit collection only started in 2000-ish when someone realized they might be a good thing to collect. The obits cut out of the newspapers, photocopied, and are stored in 3-ring binders by year. Names are alphabetized in each binder and not arranged by death date. I did not come up with this system but it works... for now.

Our index is very, very simple --- a version .0. Pertinent information is entered into an Excel spreadsheet that is saved as a PDF. Each year of the obit index will be posted to our website. An explanation (video & text) will be on the page? explaining how to search within a PDF document and how to order a copy of the obituary from us.

Here are the field labels:

- Last Name,
- First Name (including nickname),
- Maiden Name,
- Obituary Date,
- Death Date (if known)
- Newspaper 1 / 2 / 3 that the obit(s) appeared in - Brockton Enterprise / Rockland Standard / Abington Mariner
- Town the person was associated with - Abington / Rockland / Whitman

This is what we can do for researchers \*now\* to make this information accessible. We \*do\* have buckets of Server space available so we can afford to post the files

online.

The Obituary Indexes from the RB Hayes Library, Monroe County Library System and the Boston Public Library are gorgeous!

Hope this helps.

Another thing to consider is whether your catalog can support the indexing that was suggested, or whether you'd have to have a separate web site. Our staff referred to our ILS catalog as Can't Actually Run (a) Library, but that's just sour grapes.

It's been good to read everybody's thoughts on obituary indexing. We, too, were entering names into our online catalog. What I didn't like about that was not having a print backup to the online system. It's not a problem now, but when we switched over to a new version of workflows some years ago, old

obituary entries were affected in that the patron cannot see a date on their end. They need to contact us if they find a name and we have to look in it from the staff perspective to see what the date of death and the date of the newspaper is. This affects thousands of entries and there's no quick fix for it. I did, finally, get a list of the problem entries. I haven't started correcting them yet, though.

On recent obits, we had a dedicated volunteer to add in the entries, but then began to get pushback from admin about having volunteers use our online system (security reasons). They couldn't access user information at all, but it was still a concern from their point of view. So, we decided to have staff do it, but that was taking up way too much staff time. For this year, we are printing out obituaries by the month and putting them in a binder with an excel spreadsheet that we can then post online. But now, management of our department has changed and I was asked why we weren't putting names directly in to the catalog anymore. I also miss having the names in the system, too. But, if we have a print book, and a spreadsheet posted online, hopefully this can make up for the lack of database entries.

I am also interested to hear everyone else's strategies because I'm still looking for ideas, too!

The Disciples of Christ were strongest in middle Tennessee, so I would suggest giving a look at the Hill families in Franklin County for his origin.

In our local history department at the Greene County Public Library (Ohio) we have a similar resource, what we call the Historical Files and Family Files, collections of labeled manila folders of newspaper clippings that also include various other ephemera. The Historical Files cover a wide range of county-related topics: towns, schools, notable community or weather-related events, and crimes, just to name a few. You can browse our online index here:

<http://greenelibrary.info/research/greene-county-ohio-historical-files/>. The Family Files are clippings of articles on local residents--famous, infamous, or otherwise--and some include family trees and other genealogical information.

Both collections are used frequently. I don't know how many folders there are in all, but they fill up 7 rotary cabinets and we are set to order 3 more to accommodate our growing inventory. One of our senior librarians is in charge of adding to them on a weekly basis. We don't allow patrons to access the files themselves; rather we retrieve the folders for them and then refile them, straightening them up as needed, when finished.

Both are arranged by surname. We also have a vertical file collection containing biographical information about local people arranged by surname or

subject (African-Americans, Sports Hall of Fame, etc.). Our largest vertical file collection contains newspaper articles, pamphlets, photos, brochures, etc. about the county, then about the county's townships and cities and finally about the counties surrounding ours. We collect very little at the state level because of space concerns and because that can be done better elsewhere. We have other open-ended collections of bible records, ancestor charts that are housed in ring-binders. We also have a collection of published/collected family histories. The library staff maintains all of it.

Here at the Douglas County History Research Center, we have 3 filing cabinets (nearly full) of biography files. They in acid-free file folders and filed by last name, but we have actually split out the couples (Smith, John P. and Hattie; Smith, Jeremiah and Sally; etc.) The system is a bit cumbersome, and sometimes I wish we would just file by strict last name.

We used to have a volunteer who would clip the local newspaper weekly, but now they are mostly added to through reference questions or public accumulation - we add the materials and stamp them with our repository name, but occasionally we find papers put in and unstamped - probably by members of the family.

I also have volunteers going through the files and weeding duplicates, checking that the names are correct on the folders, and adding the information to our RootsMagic database.
